AUBURN ENTHUSES!

Citizens of the North and South Pool Their Issues.

Everything Harmonious and a Glorious Fourth in Anticipation.

EXCURSION TRAINS A FIXED FACT.

The meeting called for making arrangements for the Fourth of July, on Wednesday, June 17th, was well attended by citizens from both North and South Auburn, and harmony and enthusiasm was the order of the evening. The first thing on the programme was a motion to make the temporary organization permanent, which was amended and carried by adding the name of G. W. Fairbrother, Jr., as one of the secretaries, and electing D. J. Wood, Treasurer.

On motion, Messrs. Church Howe, R. O. Fellows, G. W. Fairbrother, Jr., S. Riechers, S. Dillon, O. J. Stowell and W. W. Crandall were appointed finance committee.

Committee on programme and speakers—R. O. Fellows, Gus. Moore and D. J. Wood.

On motion Church Howe was appointed a committee of one to arrange for excursion trains on each railroad.

Committee on grounds were authorized to stake off, fix the price and sell booths, and turn over the money to the finance committee.

Committee on invitation—G. W. Fairbrother, Jr., G. D. Cross and W. T. Reed.

On motion Church Howe was declared chairman of the committee on general arrangements, and requested to appoint two more—as follows: Wm. Willing and A. H. Gilmore.

On motion Church Howe was elected President of the day.

Committee of seven on music—as follows: H. J. F. Wert, O. J. Stowell, D. J. Wood, Dr. West, G. W. Fairbrother, Geo. Mutz, V. V. Morrison and Mr. Weller.

On motion Capt. W. W. Crandall and H. J. F. Wert were appointed a committee to procure and erect a flag-staff in the court house square, between North and South Auburn.

On motion it was the unanimous sense of the meeting that U. S. Senator, Chas. H. Van Wyck be requested to speak in Auburn that day.

Church Howe announced that the Senator would be here provided Congress adjourned prior to that time.

Committee on fireworks—Gus Moore, O. J. Stowell and Mr. Dillon, with instructions to "let 'em loose," beneath the stars and stripes on the court house square.

Committee on decoration—Mrs. J. D. Croan, Mrs. H. Wert, Mrs. W. T. Reed, Mrs. D. E. C. Long, Miss May Crandall, E. L. Taggart and J. D. Croan.

On motion Judge John H. Dumas was appointed chief marshal, with power to choose such assistants as he desired.

Committee on printing—Taggart, Fellows and Fairbrother.

Committee on sports—A. V. Walsh, Ted Huddart, Mr. Riechers, Jas. Hall and W. A. Eberly.

On motion merchants were requested to decorate their places of business. On motion business men were requested to suspend business between the hours of 9 a. m. and 4 p. m.

On motion Gus Moore was added to flag-staff committee, and empowered to procure suitable flag and streamer.
