O the rye, the beautiful rye, Standing five and six feet high; Covering hill, valley and lea, Our teams are suffering, panting for thee.

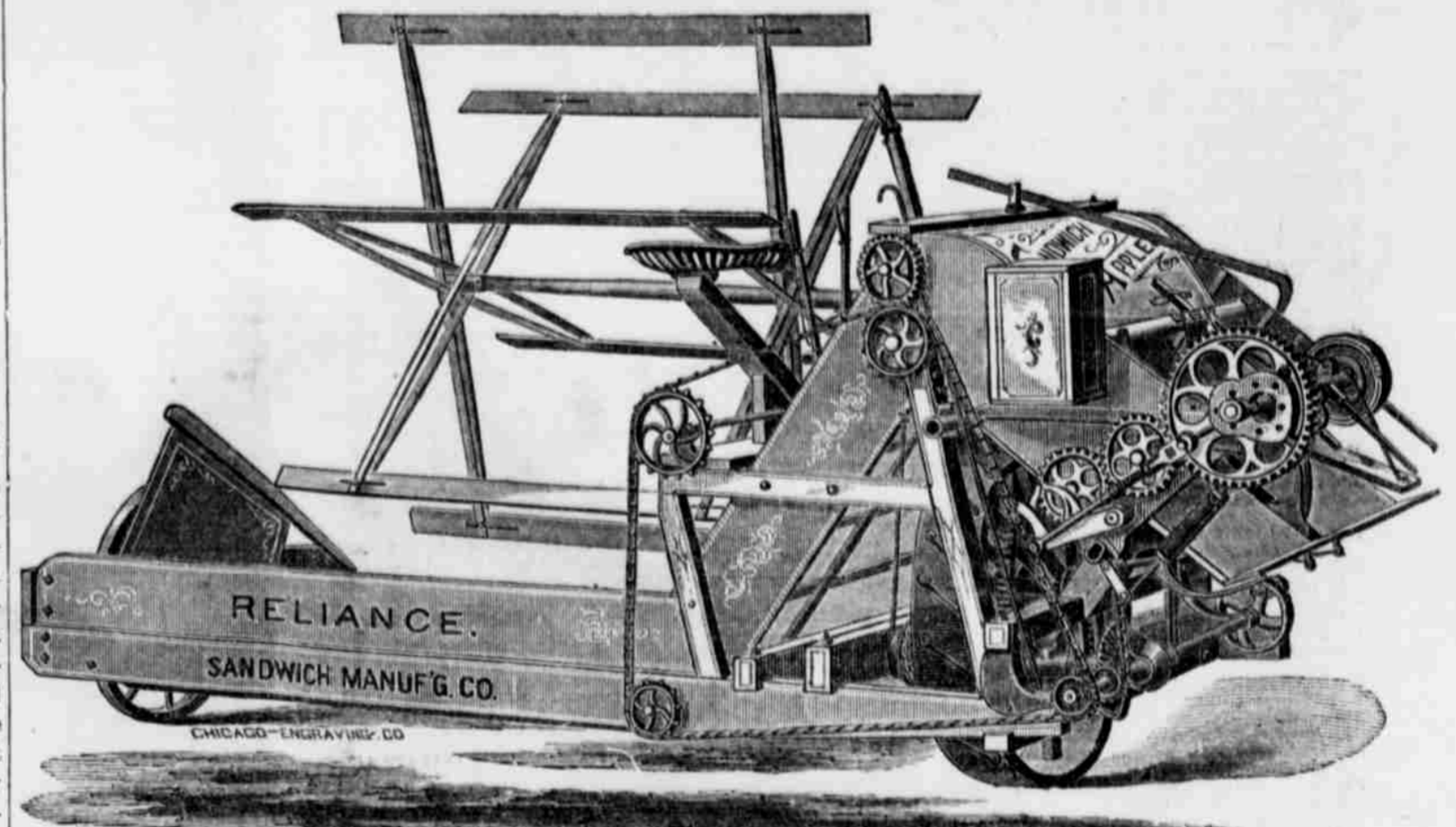
