Republican State Convention. The Republican Electors of the State of Nebraska are hereby called to send delegates from the several counties to meet in State Convention at Omaha on Wednesday, September 20th, A. D. 1882, at 7 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for the following named offices, viz:

Governor. Lieutenant-Governor. Secretary of State. Auditor. Treasurer. Attorney-General. One Regent of the University of Nebraska.

Commissioner of Public Lands and Buildings. And to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention.

The several counties are entitled to representation in the State Convention as follows, based upon the vote cast for Isaac Powers, Jr., in 1881, for regent of the State University: Giving one delegate to each one hundred and fifty (150) votes, and one delegate for the fraction of seventy-five (75) votes or over; also one delegate at large for each organized county.

It is recommended: First—That no proxies be admitted to the convention, except such as are held by persons residing in the counties from which the proxies are given.

Second—That no delegate shall represent an absent member of his delegation, unless he be clothed with authority from the county convention, or is in possession of proxies from regularly elected delegates thereof.

The immense tide of immigration which has poured in to the West during the past year has made its mark in the vast tracts taken under the homestead law. In the Southern States also there have been quantities of land taken under this act, but over one-third of the whole of the homesteads for the past fiscal year have been located in the single Territory of Dakota, where entries covering 2,187,415 acres were made, as against 1,386,872 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1881. Minnesota comes next, with homestead entries for 588,324 acres. Close to it comes Kansas, with 537,352, with Nebraska 473,816.

A Chicago paper of last week says: Another of St. Louis' pet schemes has come to a probable end. Some time ago it was decided to start a barge line between Kansas City and St. Louis, so as to compete with the railroads, it being claimed that the rates were too high. The first fleet of these barges left St. Louis Wednesday empty, to be loaded at Kansas City. Thursday night they were grounded at a point near Glasgow, and were fatally ruined.

Raped by a Negro.

Last Friday forenoon Anthony Cloyd, a young colored man who was working for Mr. Copeland, a farmer near Nemaha City, assaulted and brutally outraged Copeland's wife. The facts of the case as we gather them are about as follows: The negro pretending to be unwell, Copeland went out the farm to work leaving him to do some light work about the house. They were making butter, and while Mrs. C's back was toward Cloyd he seized her around the neck and forced her down. She being small and considerably beyond the meridian of life, the burly brute found little resistance to the gratification of his lust. After he had released her he told her that if she informed her husband of what he had done he would kill her and her husband; and for fear he would kill her then and there she made the promise. He got hold of a knife and watched all her movements for some time with fiendish vigilance. But by going about her work, as if preparing dinner, he evidently believed he had filled her with such terror that she would keep her promise, otherwise he doubtless would have killed her. Soon afterward in going about the house, her demon guard having relaxed his watchfulness, she slipped out at side door, ran into the corn field and soon found her husband telling him all that had occurred. The husband instead of going for his shot-gun, or his his neighbors and a rope, went for a constable which he soon found, and returning they found Cloyd still lingering about the scene of his heinous offense. He evidently missed the woman from the house, and why he did not run away, is the mystery of the affair. The constable made a prisoner of Cloyd, took him to Nemaha City before C. C. Donald, J. P., and waiving examination, was committed to the jail in Brownville in default of bail. Cloyd's father, mother and several sisters live at Brownville, and if half the reports about them are true they are a pretty hard outfit. Mrs. Copeland was formerly well-known in Brownville as the widow Scott, a hard-working poor lady with irreproachable reputation. On last Saturday night there was considerable talk about lynching the miscreant, so much that the sheriff at one time had arrangements made for running him to some other place, but becoming satisfied that the danger was not imminent, and that this locality was not strongly imbued with the southern methods of dealing with such cases, he simply locked the doors and hid the key. If Cloyd is not killed he is very sure to serve the state a number of years as a stone pounder and hod carrier.

It is said that within the last few weeks hundreds of bogus \$10 green-back bills have been put in circulation. They are in the main, says the National Bank Note Reporter, very clever imitations, but there are a few points of difference. In the counterfeit there is a slight irregularity noticeable in the shape of the letters on the top of the note. Also in the sentence, "This note is a legal tender for ten dollars," no space is left between the words "for" and "ten." In the word "printing" just below the words "for ten," the last four words are in italics. In the counterfeit the numbers are very irregular and the lathe work, particularly in the upper right hand corner, is blurred.

In a jumping match at Lincoln last week between Hodgkins, the champion of the state, and a man named Kirk, the former cleared thirteen feet and one inch, winning the \$100 that depended on the match, and his title to the championship.

At a ball at Bloomfield Academy, I. T. Dave Kemp and his nephew Henry Kemp, got into a fight and pistols being used both were killed. One was aged 25, the other 17.

The Republicans of Cass county have nominated E. L. Reed, for senator, and James Hall, E. H. Woolley, Samuel Gannon and H. C. Walph for members of the house.

Mrs. Chas. Hovey, near Mt. Morris, Michigan, drowned herself and a six-year old son. She tied her child to herself with a rope and plunged into the water.

Andrew Byers, a shoemaker of Indianapolis, after a protracted drunk went home and in the presence of his family shot himself through the heart.

160 car loads of peaches were taken to New York one day last week from Delaware. Each car contained 500 bushels.

Ex-Gov. Robinson has formally accepted the nomination for governor from the Greenbackers of Kansas.

G. W. Spencer, a traveling doctor of Elkhart, Ind., suicided by taking morphine.
