Missionary work seems to pan out in Madagascar. Out of a population of 2,500,000 there are 70,000 native christians. The first missionary visited that island about sixty years ago.

Near Las Vegas, N. M., at a small Mexican town, J. Y. Perry was killed in a fight with some Mexicans over a Mexican woman. Perry fell at his post, killing two greasers before he gave up his senorita.

At Anoka, Minn., a train ran into a carriage containing four young people, William Hackett, Joseph Cole, Miss Florence Baker, and Miss Lillie Dawson, returning from a dance. All four were killed, together with the horses.

A substantial farmer at Casselton, Dakota, disgusted with the report of the local papers and railway agents, desires the *Times* to state that the average crop in the very cream of the wheat district of that Territory will not exceed ten bushels per acre.

An insurrection has been raging in Corea recently and the king and queen have been assassinated. The dissatisfaction was created by a late treaty with the United States and England, which the natives thought would admit too many of those heathenish foreigners to their country.

The Atchison *Champion* says: "The Missouri Pacific will construct a branch line this fall from Atchison on the Omaha line to Lincoln, Nebraska, a distance of some twenty miles. This branch will be of material benefit to the trade of this city, and will also increase our railroad facilities."

A correspondent in Congressman Valentine's district says "The *Bee*, while professing to be the organ of the people, has appeared as the supporter of a town site corporation." We presume the *Bee* was paid for its work, as it would go back on the people very suddenly for money.

The first congressional district contains 8,000 Republican majority when united; but it will be impossible to unite a full vote on any one man. While such is undoubtedly the case, any Republican who may receive the endorsement of the convention will be endorsed at the polls by at least 6,000 majority.

Tommy Wolfe, of the Seward *Reporter* is well named—a wolf to all intents and purposes. The little coyote, who always echos the howl that comes from Rosewater's den, is now yelping across the line. "If Howe gets the nomination, the party will be divided." The coyote had better mend the party, which he has severed, in his own county, before he begins to advise others.

On the 20th ult. the British troops and Egyptians had the first battle of any consequence, since the bombardment of Alexandria. Gen. Wolseley attacked the forces entrenched under Arabi with great confidence but was repulsed with severe loss. The British soldiers did not stop in their retreat under four miles, although Arabi did not follow, and it took the presence of the great English General amongst the infantry to prevent a disastrous panic.

## Citizens Take Notice.

The time proposed is September 20, 21, 22 and 23. The first two days being for gathering the displays, the last two for exhibition. Some celebrated speaker will address the people, and a track for short races will be arranged. It is hoped from this to build up a county fair next year. We cordially invite the people of North Auburn to unite with us in this effort as we did with them in the celebration of the Fourth of July.
