A special correspondent of the State Journal was around town last week, and we extract as follows from his letter in the Journal of the 3rd inst.

The growth of Auburn is wonderful, and since the two towns, North and South Auburn, formerly known as Sheridan and Calvert, have united their fortunes under the common name of Auburn, there is a good prospect for a thrifty place. Auburn has the great advantage of a splendid farming region around it, and the land owners are wealthy as a rule. It is in the vicinity of this place that the fruit was gathered which received the premium at the Centennial, and it is from this locality that Lincoln, and the western part of the state received the larger portion of peaches used this year. The crops are very fine here, and large numbers of cattle will be fed during coming winter.

Nemaha is the garden county, and Auburn the banner town. The Hon. Church Howe is an important factor in the improvement of the place, and by his energetic endeavors is rapidly building up a town.

**THE REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.**

There are several Republican papers of Nebraska, who never know what's the matter until the Omaha Bee tells them. If the Bee howls they immediately attempt to yelp in unison. If the Bee tells them they are hurt they at once pretend to see that somebody has hit them. The platform adopted by the recent Republican State Convention was made the object for the Bee to venomously attack simply because it endorsed Valentine for congress in the third district, when the papers referred to immediately thereafter discovered that the platform was weak, meaningless and ambiguous, especially as to fundamental Republican principles and railroad corporations.

The following are the resolutions complained of:  
**Resolved,** That the Republicans of Nebraska in convention assembled stand by the fundamental principles of the Republican party as enunciated in an unbroken line of national and state platforms, the chief of which are free labor, free speech, the right of every qualified citizen to vote once at every election under the restriction of just and equitable election laws; free, non-sectarian schools; sound currency on a specie basis, under national control; the raising of national revenues by taxation of luxuries and articles of consumption not essential to the comfort and well being of the people and from a tariff on imports so adjusted as to protect the investment of capital in home industries; and legislative control of corporations.

**Resolved,** That we uphold and maintain the enforcement by well considered legislation of the change in our great organic law that prohibits unjust discrimination and extortion by railroad corporations, while recognizing the importance of fostering and protecting them as necessary factors in our progress and prosperity; and that we look to the honesty and courage of the people in their political capacity to repel encroachments of corporate power upon the rights and principles of citizens on one hand, and, on the other to deal justly and fairly with all property interests under whatever name or form, without unjust discrimination or extortion in the matter of levying taxes, or regulating prices of commodities or charge for service.

Now if those resolutions are not concise, plain, pointed, reasonable, and good Republican doctrine we never saw any that were. And every Republican who hasn't an awful sore head, or is not a chronic croaker and fault finder can and do heartily endorse them.

One of the curious incidents of this curious season of politics is the summary bouncing of the chairman and secretary of the Democratic central committee of Nemaha county, supposedly because they were too friendly to Church Howe. One of them was Moore, of the Granger. What the Democrats of old Nemaha will do for an organ remains to be seen.—State Journal.

Hon. John L. Carson, president of the Carson Bank, is in the city.

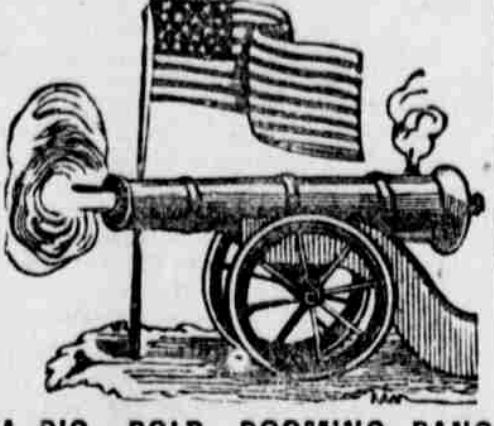
