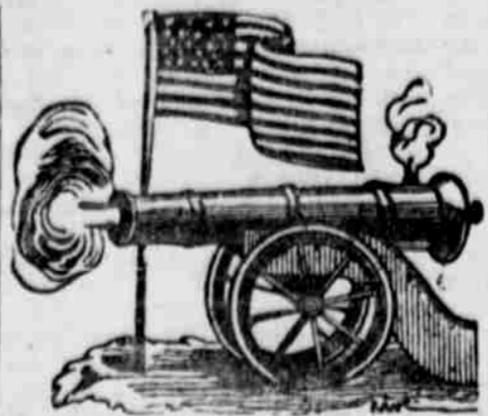
LATER.—We learn that the Senator has already begun just that kind of work.

An opinion was rendered by the Illinois supreme court recently in a case involving the question of the power of the state legislature to regulate rates charged by railroads for freight carried to points outside of Illinois, and whether the act prohibiting unjust discrimination in such rates is not in contravention of the constitution of the United States. The case is one where in sixty-six per cent. larger rate was charged on a haul from Gilman to New York, than on a haul from Peoria to New York, though the distance from Peoria is greater by eighty-six miles. It was held by the court that the charge was unjust, excessive, extortionate and unlawful, and in effect the court upheld the authority of the railroad and warehouse commissioners to regulate freight charges to points outside the state.
