A train of thirty-six wagons, four miles to the wagon, left here yesterday, loaded with corn for Government.

U. H. Parson's train of twenty wagons, loaded with freight for G. Hendrick of Council Bluffs, leaves for the west to-day.

McCormick's train of twenty-two four-wheeled wagons, arrived from the west a few days since. They will be loaded at this point, and proceed west again in a short time.

The "Hunt House" is the name given to the stand formerly known as the Nebraska House. It has been refitted throughout, and we understand will be opened for the traveling public in a short time.

The water in the river has abated somewhat during the past week, but is yet at a good stage for boating. Steamboatmen are improving this opportunity, there being hardly an hour in the day but that a whistle is heard.

We venture to say that Mr. Joel Pared has the largest lily-bush in the Territory. He brought us some stalks yesterday, one of which measured three feet ten inches in length, three feet across the leaf, and six inches around the stem. The identical log cabin in which Mr. Lincoln resided when he split rails, and learned to write, and studied law, is now on exhibition at the Great Fair at Chicago. The man who was Lincoln's partner at that time, and assisted in building the cabin, sits at the door to entertain visitors with reminiscences of the early days of the Martyr President.

The State Convention which met in Des Moines on the 14th inst., made the following nominations—all by acclamation: For Governor, the present incumbent, Governor Stone. For Lieutenant Governor, B. F. Gul, of Webster county. For Supreme Judge, Geo. G. Wright. For Superintendent of Public Instruction, Orin Feltus.

The Omaha Republican seems to think that it would be "more feasible" route for the U. P. Railroad to go by the way of Glenwood or Winifred, than to run down the bottom and get below the mouth of Platte before starting West. The Republican man evidently sees the probability of the road being changed to this side of the Platte, and can only try to ridicule the idea.

Steamer Denver discharged a vast amount of freight at our levee on last Thursday evening, including 50,000 pounds of machinery for C. F. Hendrick, of Council Bluffs. Among the passengers aboard we saw W. H. H. Waters, late editor of the Nebraska City Press, and G. W. Smead, Sheriff of Otoe county. They were making a visit, with their families, to the rural districts above the Platte.

The local editor of the Council Bluffs Nonpareil was assaulted recently by a cowardly copperhead, because of an article which had appeared the day before. This is not in accordance with the expounded doctrine of "free press."

The editor in chief comes out and tells the assaulter that he alone is responsible for what may appear in the columns of the paper, and that he can generally be "found at home" if any one feels aggrieved.

Our exchanges inform us that the "Army Worm" is making its appearance in various parts of the country. Let our farmers keep a sharp look out for this enemy of vegetation. We are informed that it can be effectually "dank ed" by plowing a deep furrow around the field; the worms will crawl into this and can't get out, when all that remains to be done, is to drag a log through the trench every few days, and slaughter the assailants by wholesale.

Plattsmouth is the starting point for a vast amount of freight the present season. Not less than five hundred thousand pounds of freight has left here for the west within the past week. Among other trains, we notice that of C. Hurd, jr., with about one thousand thousand pounds, consisting of machinery for a Quarts mill which Mr. H. proposes setting up at or near Bannock City Montana. He has the largest mill ever taken to the western mines.

CORONER'S INQUIRY.—Coroner Sturges held an inquest yesterday upon the body of an unknown man, who was found floating in the Mo. River, three miles from this city. He had been stabbed in the neck and throat, four times, was a thick set man, about 5 ft. 8 or 9 inches high, had on, when found, a buttoned colored pair of pants, lined, a hickory undershirt, and a canvas or duck over-shirt. One leather suspender and one canvas vest, a hickory necktie, and a piece of leather tied or sewed around his left wrist, which was about two inches in width. Also a left boot on his right foot, but he could wear a number 8 or 9, but the boot was a number 12. He was apparently 35 or 40 years of age.—Bellevue Times.

REGULATIONS ON THE PLAINS. According to the provisions of Gen. Orders No. 41, series of 1865 issued on the 10th of February, the Post Commanders of Forts Riley and Kearney, are required to halt all trains passing West, and organize them in bodies of one hundred armed men under the command of a captain appointed for that purpose. This regulation has since been extended to all the Missouri River towns, with the exception that trains from any of them are required to be organized in bands of fifty armed men instead of one hundred. Serg't McMacken is in the city for the purpose of organizing trains leaving this point, under the above mentioned orders.
