For the benefit of persons liable to the Excise Law I would state that Section 103 requires a duty of two and one-half per centum on Gross Receipts for the transportation of passengers, merchandise, &c., for hire. Freighters are considered liable to this Section. Persons delivering the freight are the ones responsible for the tax. The provision in the law mentioning the right of adding the amount of tax to freight, "where contract," only applies in cases where the law of the State, where the contract for carrying the freight was made, has fixed the compensation; and in those cases the Act of Congress gives the right to the freighter to add the tax to the freight as fixed by law.
