LOCAL NEWS.

Mr. Thomas Batts and family arrived safely in town on Monday from Dublin, Ireland.

A number of our citizens started for Omaha to-day to get a sly peep at Gen. Sherman, who arrived there yesterday.

We see it stated in the Nonpareil that Gen. Sherman is expected to arrive in Council Bluffs in the course of a few days.

There are indications that the military authorities intend shortly to abandon the defense of Washington south of the Potomac.

Nearly 4,000 enlisted men, from different regiments serving in the Union army, have recently been transferred to the Veteran Reserve Corps.

The manufacture of a new Atlantic cable has commenced. The Great Eastern has been engaged for five years for cable purposes.

The Emperor Maximilian has decreed that his ambassadors shall receive a salary of \$15,000—provided he can raise the money.

An ingenious Frenchman has made a mosaic landscape composed of insects. It contains more than 45,000 beetles, besides big and little bugs of various hues.

A gentleman well experienced in the matter estimates that Sangamon, Ill. produces this year nearly 1,000,000 pounds of wool, and that about 500,000 pound are in the market waiting sale.

We learn that a little daughter of Mr. Wm. Ford's was severely injured on Sunday last while out riding with her grandfather. The carriage upset, throwing her out and breaking a rib.

Joseph Botwin & Co. received by the steamer Montana last Monday some 11,000 pounds of marble for their works in this city. Those in want of work in this line will do well to call on them, as they are doing a little the nicest work that has been seen in the west.

Mr. George Boeck is building a substantial brick blacksmith shop on vine street. This is the class of men we want, such as will go ahead and make improvements of a substantial character, and thereby show that our city is not a temporary concern.

The freighting from Plattsmouth west has held up better this fall than ever before, and in fact better than any other point on the river. Freight is not quite so high as they were six weeks ago yet the amount sent out does not appear to diminish any of consequence.

The Hannibal & St. Joseph R. R. and Packet line is doing an immense business this fall. The rush of freight for the upper Missouri has been so great that the company have been compelled to put on extra boats, and are now running a daily line of first class steamers in connection with the railroad.

We learn that the Good Templars are becoming a solid institution in our midst. We are glad to hear it. Their principles are excellent, and their work will impress upon the minds of our youth the worth of strict temperance habits.

The election yesterday passed off quietly. There was some loud talk, and a few individuals showed a disposition to be quarrelsome; but as a general rule things were very quiet for election day. We understand that one or two "knock-downs" occurred in the evening, but the difficulties arose from other things than politics.

The manufacture of molasses is steadily increasing in this Territory, and our farmers are learning by experiment to produce almost as good an article as the famous Golden Syrup. Mr. T. J. Todd left a specimen at our office last week which surpasses anything in the shape of Sorghum we have ever seen. It was the color of our lightest brown sugar, and entirely free from that unpleasant taste that usually accompanies the Sorghum molasses. It could hardly be made only the day previous, it was already granulated, and is now almost a solid mass of sugar.

The Rev. G. C. Betté informs us that he received a letter from Bishop Talbot last week in which the Bishop directs him to proceed at once to lay the foundation for the Church for St. Luke's Parish, and added that the plans (which were sent out to the architect to be remodelled) were nearly completed, and that the superstructure was to be erected in the coming spring, would be a model of architectural beauty and an ornament to the town. The Vestry of the parish have regretted the necessity for delay, but they were obliged to return the plans to New York, and without these the building of course could not be undertaken.

Such delay however is a benefit rather than an injury; when caused by a desire to improve the style and secure the most desirable edifice.
