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From the New York Herald. The FORTHCOMING MESSAGE OF PRESIDENT JOHNSON.

No document ever penned by an American statesman since the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution of the United States, and the first inauguration of the lamented Lincoln will be read on both sides of the Atlan tic with so much interest as the forthcoming message of President Johnson. Providentially called to the chief executive chair at an extraordinary crisis, when the country was first emerging from the blood and smoke of a terrible civil war, and when the world was horror stricken by the news of Lincoln's assassination, President Johnson assumed his onerous duties at a moment's notice, and has since discharged them with an energy, tact and discretion that cannot be too highly extolled. It is true that he has often delivered short off-hand speeches to various visitors and delegations; but such speeches are always more or less unpremeditated, and cannot be accepted as official and authoritative expositions of the Presidennal policy. This policy involves the admission of regularly elected repre sentatives from the Southern States to Congress; and whether that point is to as a corollary of the restoration policy, it will, we hope, be so clear and incontrovertible as to remove every reasonable doubt that may be entertainupon the subject in any quarter. Of course, Congress will have to be organized before the President's message is received, and we anticipate that, as the time for action approaches, the radicals will abandon the revolutionary projects which they have been recently concoct-Hardware, Queensware, ing, and allow all the legal members of the House to take their seats with

In any event we believe that its declarations and explanations in regard to the President's poticy will be so satisfactory to the American people that there will be no ground left for such constitutional or unconstitutional grumblers as Wendell Phillips, who appear to think it their special mission to find fault with everybody and everything, not excluding themselves. Wherever the foreign policy of the government is intimately connected with the subject of restoration it will be amply treated; but it is not likely that much space will be devoted to our foreign relations in detail.
