

LOCAL NEWS.

From Thursday's Daily. Gen. G. M. Dodge has arrived in Omaha.

Maj. Balcombe, of the Republican, has gone to Chicago for more new material. The Major is bound to keep his establishment up to the times, and a little ahead.
