ORDINANCE No. 69.
An Ordinance to authorize the Council to borrow money for the purchase of the Ferry Boat Paul Wilson, Ferry Franchise, with right-of-way, of the Company.
Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Plattsmouth, that at the same time and under the same regulations that is prescribed for holding an election by Ordinance No. 57, "An Ordinance to authorize the City Council of Plattsmouth to borrow money for the purpose of grading and furnishing ties for a railroad running from Plattsmouth, Cass County, Nebraska, to intersect the Union Pacific Railroad in Sarpy County, Nebraska," the following proposition be also submitted to be voted upon, to-wit: Authorizing the said Council, to borrow money, not exceeding nine thousand dollars, by issuing bonds for the purpose of purchasing the Ferry Boat, Paul Wilson and Ferry Franchise and Right of Way belonging to the Plattsmouth Ferry Company.
Sec. 2. This Ordinance to take effect and be in force from and after its publication according to law.

ORDINANCE No. 68.
An Ordinance to amend an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to authorize the City Council of Plattsmouth to borrow money for the purpose of grading and furnishing ties for a railroad running from Plattsmouth, Cass County, Nebraska, to intersect the Union Pacific Railroad in Sarpy County."
Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Plattsmouth, That Sec. (1) of said Ordinance be amended so as to read as follows: "An Ordinance to authorize the City Council of Plattsmouth to borrow money for the purpose of grading and furnishing ties for a railroad running from Plattsmouth, Cass County, Nebraska, to intersect the Union Pacific Railroad at the next practical point in Sarpy County."
Sec. 2. This Ordinance to take effect and be in force from and after its publication according to law.
