## THE TAX QUESTION

"4th. Equal taxation of every species of property, according to value. including Government Bonds and other public securities."

"Now let us ask the poor man of Nebrasks how much tax the Collector of Internal Revenue gets from him yearly? How many men in Cass County pay i tax to the government, and who are they; and how many and who would pay a tax under the rule laid down the Demecratic platform? Under the present system, which our Democr .ti friends say is so very burthensome to the poor man, we are perfectly safe in saying that not one man in twenty in the State of Nebraska pays a cent of tax, and it is only those who are weal thy that pay at all.
