**SEYMOUR AND THE SOLDIERS.**  
 On the return of the 22nd Regiment, N. Y. S. Volunteers, to this city they were marched to the Governor's residence. When he made his appearance he greeted them with a few cool remarks, telling them in substance that they would be dismissed and sent to their homes. This out Col. Phelps severely, and riding up in front of where the Governor stood, he said: "Governor, if my men have done their duty, I wish you would tell them so, and if not I wish you would tell them so." They left over 1,000 strong and returned with about 300 men fit for duty, the rest killed or maimed by reason of their vice. The men cheered the Colonel, but no cheers were heard for Seymour.—*Albany Evening Journal.*  
 The Tennessee Rebels, emboldened by the action of the late Democrat Convention, and the letter of Frank Blair, are seriously contemplating the overthrow of the present Tennessee State Government. The Ku Klux Klan men trouble and are well organized. They warn the negroes that they will not be hurt if they abstain from politics, but the white Republicans are to be murdered without mercy. The meeting of the Legislature, called for the 27th inst., will not be a moment too soon.  
 An immense Republican mass meeting was held in Des Moines, Iowa, on the night of the 18th. The East Des Moines and West Des Moines Grant Clubs were out in strong force, each headed by a brass band. When they united, the procession fell a mile long, and, with their 500 torches and flags, made a very imposing appearance. After marching through the principal streets, the crowd assembled in Court House square to listen to the speeches of T. D. Ingersoll of Muscatine, and Gen. L. A. Grant.  
 The Manchester Union tells a good story. In the northern part of Merrimack county a crowd of the rebels and their wives were sitting on a piazza the other day, when an old traveler, ragged, dusty, rusty, unshaved and unshorn, and evidently half-dead over, strolled up to the piazza and stared vacantly at the crowd, which began to ply him with questions. Finally a man said to him, "You're a Seymour man aren't you old fellow?" Straightening up, the old chap answered, "From my present appearance you would probably judge I was a Democrat, but I ain't. I learned my politics before I took to drink." This traveler was not Frank Blair.  
**BELMONT.**  
 On the 7th of July the Cincinnati Enquirer tendered Belmont this loving fare well.  
 "Mr. Belmont, as chairman, unfortunately of the Democratic National Committee, called the New York Convention to order and nominated its temporary chairman. This perhaps, was his right, but he certainly was not called upon to afflict the convention with a set political speech, which he appears to have done.
