We find the following complimentary notice of our new ferryboat and her energetic captain in a recent number of the St. Joseph Union: "G. W. McGee is building a staunch little craft at our landing, to be used as a ferry boat at Plattsmouth, Nebraska. The hull was built up on the Nodaway, and was towed down to this city on Tuesday to be finished and receive the necessary machinery. When completed, which will be in about four weeks, she will be one of the most substantial ferryboats on the Upper Missouri.
