LOCAL NEWS.
 From *Thursday's Daily*,
 The "Calico Party," last night was a complete success. The attendance was large, and everything passed off pleasantly.
 The *Republican* thinks that with "a little fixing" the O. & S. W. and the O. & N. W. Railroads will be very good roads. We are glad to hear it.
 The *Chronicle* has a Washington correspondent who signs himself "Looking Around." Wonder if he is "looking around" like the fellow whom Hays, of *Freemont Tribune*, tells about.
 Commissioner Harris arrived this morning from the east, and has opened an office on the corner of Vine and Third Streets, where persons interested can enquire in regard to the B. & M. Railroad Lands.
 They have had a "match game" at manufacturing horse shoes in Omaha - and some fellow came out second best. The winner turned out 101 shoes, all finished except corking, in two hours and nineteen minutes.
 The *News* advertising a roll of greenbacks as "lost between Ward's Bank and Wm. E. Hill," reminds us of sundry bonds issued by Otoe county to the B. & M. R. R. which was most effectually lost between Hamburg and J. Sterling Morton. - *State Journal*.
 Coal brought over the B. & M. and C. B. & St. Joe Railroads sells at Nebraska City, by the car load, at \$9.50 per ton. This is much cheaper fuel than they have had at Nebraska City heretofore and it is stated what we have always said, that the completion of the B. & M. to Plattsburgh was a "big thing" for the entire State.
 We are in receipt of a note of thanks from Rev. Geo. S. Alexander, Commissioner of Agriculture for the State, for our note in regard to the B. & M. R. R. Lands, inserted in the article taken from the advanced sheets of his book, and he assures us the facts shall appear in the work. The *HERALD* is just now filled with matter relating to the interests of the State, and the Commissioner will find it profitable to draw heavily from our columns. We are aiming to give nothing but facts, and to give those in a concise manner.
 The new M. E. Church is not quite completed, but is near enough so as to hold services. It is a neat, well-arranged building, and is a credit to the society and to the pastor who has labored so diligently in its construction. The entrance, the class rooms, and the gallery are all well arranged, and the seats are of that pattern which allows a persons used to attend to the sermon instead of constantly studying how to change position for the better. They elected a committee of four to attend a county convention to be held Feb. 5th and instructed them to enquire into the "means used" to secure the issuing of the \$150,000 in bonds, in which certain citizens of that county are supposed to be interested.
