We understand that W. W. Erwin has disposed of his law library, and will return to New York, his former home, in a short time.

The old Second Street bridge will probably be torn down to-morrow and the piles driven for the new one.

The railroad company need to enlarge their freight grounds, and a freight house is badly needed.

S. H. Mallory, Assistant Superintendent of the R. & M. R. R. is in the city on business.
