LONDON, Jan. 14.

A dispatch from Versailles announces

that the French are removing heavy guns

from the front and making vigorous

attacks. The Bank of France commenced to

issue forced paper money.

BREVETIERS, Jan. 17.

Bourbaki attacked the Germans before

Belfort, and the latter were obliged to

abandon the whole line. The combat was

obstinate and lasted till dark. The French

renewed the fight on the 16th and

were repulsed with heavy loss in

BRUSSELS, Jan. 17.

Prince DeJouville, who was commis-

sioned as Major by Chausy, has been re-

instated by order of Gambetta and sent to

England.

LONDON, January 13.

A Paris dispatch, of the 13th, says

Gambetta's last dispatch to the authori-

ties here, which was suppressed yester-

day by them, called upon Gen. Trochu

to make the forts and make vigorous

attacks upon the Germans so that they

might be prevented from detaching men

from Paris to reinforce the armies in the

provinces. Inaction here injures the

cause of the republic. The violent

republicans in the city insist on the

adoption of Greek fire for military pur-

poses. Three men in Paris declare that

they possess the secret of its manufac-

ture. Gen. Trochu opposes the atrocious

idea.

LONDON, January 17.

I have the most unquestionable

authority for stating that Bismarck is very

seriously ill. He is not, however, as

seriously ill as is generally supposed. His

efforts are made to conceal the fact. I

words used by Otto Ruzel, the English

Envoy, who sailed last Saturday, which
