LOCAL NEWS.  
The case of J. Sterling Morton vs. the State of Nebraska will come up before the Supreme Court at the present session.

Our efficient Street Commissioner seems determined to bring those missing crossings to the surface, and is putting in several new ones. He has completed one across Main at the junction of Fifth street, and is now finishing two more between Second and Third streets.

The Republican Convention of the District of Columbia has nominated A. R. Shepard and John P. Cook as delegates, and F. E. Bassett and A. W. Green alternates, to the Philadelphia National Convention. Cook and Green are colored.

The attention of our sportsmen is called to the fact that the sand bar above the city is covered, in spots, with wild geese. We only charge one fat goose for the information. Bring out that new shot gun.

Passengers from California, who have reached Chicago, deny that there has been much suffering on the Pacific road beyond the mere fact of detention. A Comptroller and Coal car accompaniments, and the company have done what was in their power to make passengers comfortable.

The number of miles of railroad built in the State of Illinois in the year 1871, aggregates 502, being nearly twice as much as any other State.

The ice bridge across old muddy which has served our people so well during the winter, gave way this morning and commenced moving out, but the ice soon gorged in the bend below, where at present writing, it remains. Should the weather continue warm, the boats will be able to transfer in a few days.

Messrs. Hubbard & Beardsley are putting up a large grist mill on the Weeping Water, about one and a half miles above the Falls. They expect to have the mill completed and in running order by the first of August next. Such improvements as these do much to build up the county.

It is claimed that after Senator Sumner had prepared his French Arms resolution, he handed the same to his colleague with the remark: "Grants' nomination won't be heard of ten days hence."

Indiana gains one member of Congress by the new apportionment, who will be elected by the vote of the State at large. The Republicans have nominated Godlove S. Oeth, for this position. Tom. Brown has been nominated for Governor.

The State Convention for the election of six delegates to the National Republican Convention, will be called about the 16th of May. Each organized county will send one delegate, and one additional for every 100 votes for Taff, or major fraction thereof.

Mr. W. J. Horton, of Weeping Water, was in town to-day. Mr. Horton has one hundred and fifteen acres in winter wheat which he thinks is unsurpassed by the weather. We hope to hear similar good reports from all.

Cuning County has voted \$20,000 for Court House and Jail.

A steam saw mill has been located at Franklin, the county seat of Franklin county, and will be in operation early in the spring. Parties here will take a store there as soon as the weather will permit. E. A. Kirkpatrick of this county is now there looking after the interests of the town.

KEARNEY BRIDGE.  
The Central Star says:—"Already the bridge builders at the Kearney Railroad Bridge have an engine driving the immense hammers that pound the large piles into the sandy bed of the Platte River. But that is not enough—two other engines are on their way to Kearney to push the work along. The B. & M. R. R. Company mean business, and it will not be long before the bridge will be completed."

NEW TRANSFER BOAT.  
The B. & M. R. Co. in Neb. have an entirely new boat building at Madison on the Ohio River for business at this point, and she is expected here in sixty days. She will be built in the most substantial manner to meet the requirements which the exigencies of the business on this Road demand. She will have a center track capable of transferring two passenger and one baggage car, or five freight cars at each trip. Her engines are of the most substantial character, and she will undoubtedly prove the finest craft of the kind on this river. The B. & M. Co., with that prudent business forethought which has always distinguished them, have seen the business of their road growing with an almost unparalleled rapidity, and propose to be ready for the still greater increase which will immediately follow their connection with the U. P. R. R. at Fort Kearney. The transfer at this point the approaching season will be many times greater than ever before. Soon Platts mouth will call for a "land timber concert."

HOME MANUFACTURES.  
The morning is loud and reaches us from every quarter that the farmers of Nebraska are becoming slaves to foreign manufactures. The absolute returns in cash for the grains raised in this State are nearly balanced by the payments to foreign manufacturers. We ask a patient investigation of the facts, and it will be found the Thrashers, Harvesters, Headers, Reapers, Mowers, Seeders, Cultivators, Drills, Plows, Wagons, and all sorts of Wooden Wares, are obtained from abroad, when they could readily be manufactured in Nebraska. We ship hides abroad and import our leather—buying the same hides, after passing through foreign tanneries, at a heavy profit to the foreign dealers. Numerous other articles which could readily be made at home are imported, and the result is that while the hardworking farmer is doing his utmost to relieve his indebtedness, he is really working for foreign manufacturers.—Thousands upon thousands of dollars in the shape of notes are now held for collection by the attorneys of Nebraska against our farmers, for purchases of these foreign manufactures, which can be made at home. The question is, shall Nebraska remain tributary, and her people the slaves and crippled finances of the manufacturers of other States?

A fine drove of fat steers passed through our city to-day. They belong to Wm. Dowers, of South Bend president, who ships them to Chicago.

We are glad to see our farmers turning their attention to the feeding of stock, as the raising of grain to ship at the present unmercenary prices affords no profit. Mr. Dowers, and others engaged in the business of stock raising, know full well that a bushel of corn is worth more than 18 cents to feed to either cattle or hogs, and are not slow to take advantage of this fact. Our farmers will become independent when they sell less corn and more stock.

The City Council passed, last evening, an ordinance creating Chicago, Washington and Lincoln avenues. The want of these highways has long been felt by our city, and should they be opened, as they ought to be, soon, the wisdom of these measures will soon be made apparent, by the advantage they will give all parts of our city. They are all natural approaches from the country, and once laid out and side walks and crossings made, will form the most beautiful streets of the city. Let those leaning in charge the securing of the right of way attend to the matter at once, that they may be opened to the public.

The Council in this matter have acted wisely, and the people will say "well done."

The Perior Transcript in an article on the subject of the Vice Presidency, says:—"A Washington correspondent telegraphs that the friends of Senator Wilson, of Massachusetts, will press the claims of that gentleman for vice-President on the Republican ticket, adding that he had already secured several States, among which they named Illinois.
