### TAXES.

Some \$15,000 interest on coupon bonds of that county became due on the 1st inst., and but \$8,000 was in the Treasury. The balance of the coupons are now in the bank in the shape of protested pa per. The Treasurer is making every ef ] fort to collect the delinquent taxes and settle up to save the credit of the county. It was a mistake to make the interest of the bonds payable before September of

Cass County is in better shape. Her tax is only 13 mills, (a lighter tax than is paid in any other county except Saline and Platte) and her debt is only about 200,000. The debt is in the shape of Railsoad bonds, and the tax on the R. R. property pays the interest.

This tax of 13 mills was enough to keep us so near square that Cass county warrants sell for 95 cts., and if it was not for the hard times which makes taxes so slow coming in, they would be par-
