Council Chamber, June 17, 1872. Council met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—Mayor, Aldermen Cushing, Vivian, Duke, Wayman, Buttery, Clark and Marshall.

The Journal of last meeting read and approved. A petition was presented for certain sidewalks in the south part of the city, and,

On motion, referred to Committee on Highways and Bridges, with instructions to draft ordinance for same.

Mr. M. H. Murphy was present and asked the Council to make an appropriation to aid in procuring fire works for the Soldiers' Bazaar to be held in Plattsmouth on the 25th of June, 1872.

It was moved that \$50 be appropriated, and motion lost.

RELEVILLE, Canada, June 22. An accident occurred here this morning on the Grand Trunk railroad, to a train from Toronto to Montreal.
