COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS. COUNCIL CHAMBER, July 27, 1872. Council met pursuant to call. Present: Mayor, White, Aldermen, Buttery, Duke, Vivian, Cushing; Clerk and Marshal.

On motion the reading of the journal was dispensed with and rules suspended. The Mayor presented the following call to wit: COENIG, Chairman, City of Plattsmouth.

The Councilmen and Clerk of the City of Plattsmouth, Cass county, Nebraska, will take notice that a special meeting of the Council of said city is hereby called to meet at the Council Chamber, on the 27th day of July 1872, at eight o'clock p. m. The subject of said meeting is to take action on the following subject: To provide for a Special Election to submit to the voters of said city, a proposition to vote bonds of said city in aid of the St. Louis and Nebraska Trunk Rail Road. Also to canvass the votes of the Special Election held on the 22d day of July 1872, for the purpose of voting bonds to aid in building a seminary, also for building a High School.

A notice for a Special Election was then presented. It was then Moved that the said election be called on the 31st day of August 1872 on which a vote was taken resulting as follows: Ayes: Cushing, Vivian, Duke and Buttery. Nays—None.

Motion carried and Clerk instructed to have said notice published as provided by law.

The council then proceeded to canvass the votes of the Special Election, held on the 22d day of July 1872, to vote bonds in aid of building a high school and Seminary, which resulted as follows: For Bonds for High School, 103, Against " " " " 51.

Majority for Bonds, 142 For interest and principal on High School Bonds, 193 Against " " " " 50

Majority for interest &c., 143 For Bonds for college and Seminary, 154 Against " " " " 82

Majority for Bonds, 72 For principal and interest for college and seminary, 153 Against " " " " 82

Majority for interest &c., 71 On motion the Bonds were declared carried and the clerk instructed to have the same published two weeks in the Weekly NEBRASKA HERALD, a vote was taken on the above proposition, resulting as follows: Ayes—Buttery, Duke, Vivian, Cushing, Nays—None. Carried.
