The Baccalaureate address by the Chancellor was spoken of very highly, as also the address by Hon. C. F. Manderson, of Omaha. The graduates were three in number. Messrs. Hurd, Malleck, and Stevenson. The graduating exercises took place on Wednesday, commencing at 10 a. m. The graduates were introduced by Chancellor Benton, and Mr. Hurd delivered an address on "Ambition," Mr. Malleck on "Natural Talent," and Mr. Stevenson on "Count di Cavour." All of them creditable.

Then, after a short address from Gov. Furnas, as President of the Board of Regents, Chancellor Benton in a few appropriate remarks conferred on the Seniors, the degree of Bachelor of Science and presented them their diplomas. An ALUMNI ASSOCIATION was formed by the graduating classes of this and last year.

At the meeting of the Board of Regents, the Crelver farm, situated two and a half miles north-east of the University was selected for the "Model Farm," consisting of 320 acres of improved land.

Wednesday evening the exercises closed with an entertainment by the PALLADIAN LITERARY SOCIETY, which was reported most excellent.

Altogether the Commencement Exercises of our State University, show in marked degree, improvement and earnest effort for the success of the institution.

Dissolution of an Illinois Grange. We publish elsewhere in this issue a letter from Bushnell, in this State, giving an account of the circumstances attending the disbandment of Good Hope Grange, No. 198, of the order of Patrons of Husbandry. The lodge is represented as one of the largest in McDonough County. The preamble accompanying the resolution of dissolution constitutes a very strong indictment of the central State organization. It charges that although the order was organized for beneficent purposes, it has been diverted to base and ignominious ends. It declares: 1. That the officers have assumed powers that are tyrannical, arbitrary, and subversive of good in the lodge and in the community; that the officers composing the Grand State organization are not the true representatives of the members of the order, and that the officers of the National Grange have arrogated to themselves an unwarranted autocratic authority, ruling as with a rod of iron. 2. That large sums of money have been collected by the State and National Granges, for what no adequate return is made to the individual members of subordinate societies. 3. That there is a disposition on the part of the chief officers of the order to divert it from its original purpose, and to make of it a political party to be used to advance the personal and political fortunes of certain leaders.—Interior Ocean.

Watering a Steer in the Ear. A negro laborer in Baltimore has recently made a scientific discovery in the application of hydropathy for the cure of rampage in cattle. A day or two ago a large number of cattle were being driven through the streets of that city, when one of their number, a festively-inclined steer, with well developed horns, concluded to have a little "talk" with the city folks. He first settled grudgingly had against some of the drovers, and then turned his attention to an unoffending dray horse. He engaged in making it extremely hot for the horse, his attention was attracted to a crowd of clerks standing in the door of a dry goods store.
