



At Mr. Tilton's request Mr. Beech-er repaired with him to his house, where Eliza-beth was waiting for him, and learned from her beth was waiting for him, and learned from her lips the truth of the stories so far as they con-cerned her. This interview resulted in a written retraction of the charges by Mrs. Tilton, who, in a sort of a postscript to the retraction, denied ex plicitly that Mr. Beecher had ever offered any im plicitly that Mr. Beecher had ever offered any im-proper solicitations to her.
