THE EXTENSION OF THE BONDS.

As there seems to be some misunderstanding about the late call of the County Commissioners, to extend the bonds of the Trunk and W. W. Railroads, the Herald, without giving any advice in the matter, but solely for information, will state the facts.

When the bonds were voted two years ago now, times were very different. Railroad building was easy, bonds were readily saleable in New York or Boston. We could not altogether foresee the hard times that have overtaken us. The voters, that voted for the bonds then, certainly wanted these roads and were willing to give the bonds to get them built. Owing to the great change in money matters in '74, these roads could not be, or were not built. Now many of the same persons, who then wanted the roads, have petitioned the Commissioners to call an election to extend the time, so that new parties can come in and build the roads. No new bonds are asked for, no new proposition is to be voted on. The Commissioners only performed their duty, and it simply remains for the people to perform what they deem their duty. If the majority of the voters of Cass County do not wish to give the new companies a chance to build the road, they will be voted down; and if a majority want railroads had enough, the extension will be granted. There's all there is of it.

We shall only state further, that there is no doubt now but that Mr. Fitzgerald, and others interested, are in dead earnest this time and if the extension is granted, the roads will be built. See letters elsewhere on both sides.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION HALL.

LINCOLN, June 9th, 1875. I arrived here Monday and found the Con. Cons hard at work. I am better pleased with the body since I came here; they are a hard working lot of men and, I really believe, are doing their best to make a good Constitution. I do not say I will vote for the document they put forth, nor that the Herald will support the same as a good Constitution for the State of Nebraska, but I do think much damage and misconception has come from publishing the reports of the committee and commenting on them as if they were the final work of the Convention. These reports are very much cut down and often entirely changed before adoption. It costs the State too much to hold a Constitutional Convention for the newspapers to be able to afford to prejudice the people beforehand against the work of this body.

Therefore propose to wait until the work is completed and presented to the people, and then we shall form our judgment and decide whether it is a good work or not.

HON. GEO. SMITH, Chairman, passed yesterday with less cutting and alteration than almost any other Section adopted.

THIS MORNING a huge fight came up over the following article on the election of U. S. Senator, introduced by Jim Doon:

"The Legislature may provide that at the general election immediately preceding the expiration of the term of a United States Senator from this State, the electors may, by ballot, exercise their preference for the election of a candidate for U. S. Senator. The votes cast for such candidates shall be canvassed and returned in the same manner as State officers."

In a hurry and without proper consideration, the convention adopted this in Committee of the Whole, but when it came up this morning they were taken into "Jim" and his pet and slaughtered it right and left.

They think now they will close their endeavors here early next week; the talk is that they will adjourn on Friday in order to give the Engraving Clerk time to get all the bills in order, and then by meeting on Tuesday they can close the business by Wednesday.

BONDS EXTENSION.

ED. HERALD: As we are about to vote on the extension of our R. R. bonds and I find a very strong disposition abroad to vote against the extension, I beg leave to say a few words through the Herald in favor of extending our chance for a few railroads.

It is urged that it will increase our taxation exorbitantly. We did not think so when we voted the bonds two years ago, or at least we thought we should receive benefits enough, to compensate for that. I think we shall still. It is not the levy to pay our bonds, that increases our taxation so much; it is the expense of our public officials and our own local improvements, that we demand of our city and county officials, that increases our taxes. I believe it can be shown that these roads, if built, will return in taxable property nearly, if not quite as much, as the county will pay out in taxes. Take the Trunk as an example. The bonds voted were \$130,000; the interest would be \$13,000 per year. Now 25 miles of road at \$1,000 per mile, (the valuation on road beds last year) would be \$250,000, and the tax on that alone at 30 mills, the average county tax, would be \$9,000. Besides this, at least three handsome villages would grow up on the line of the road, that in all probability would have already been built before 18 months, and they would, no doubt, bring a great deal of new taxable property into the county. The same may be said of the W. W. road.

More than this, as I am sadly afraid the grasshoppers will injure the whole county a great deal, as they have already in the southern part of the county, and I believe it would, in view of the prospect of a general grasshopper raid, be the very best thing we could do, to vote to set this thing going.

THE INDIANS.

Red condensed fog, speckled-floated narrative, little dog, big dog, poor wolf and fat wolf, have all left Washington and no treaty yet negotiated by Nebraska. One more farced ended. Now Uncle Sam, please wake up to the importance of this Indian question. UNION SABBATH SCHOOL CONVENTION.

The Cass County Sabbath School Convention met according to previous announcement at the M. E. Church, June 1st, 1875.

Rev. D. Marquette, President, in the chair. J. R. Reed, Secretary pro-tem.

Opened with devotional exercises, conducted by Rev. D. Marquette.

Minutes of the first convention held at Weeping Water, on the 16th of December, 1874, were read.

The report of the committee on constitutionality was received and committee discharged.

The following is the constitution as adopted:

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I. NAME AND OBJECT.

SECTION 1. The Society shall be called the Cass County Sabbath School Association, and shall be auxiliary to the Sabbath School Association of Nebraska.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP.

SECTION 1. Any person may become a member of this Association by paying into the Treasury of this Association the sum of one dollar.

ARTICLE III. OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The officers of this Association shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and a Recording Secretary.

SECTION 2. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Association, and shall have general and superintending care of the same, and shall see that the duties of the officers are performed.

SECTION 3. The Vice President shall have general and superintending care of the same, and shall see that the duties of the officers are performed.

SECTION 4. The Recording Secretary shall keep a true record of the proceedings of each meeting of the Association, and shall see that the same are published in the Herald.

SECTION 5. The Corresponding Secretary shall see that the reports of the several schools in the county are published in the Herald, and shall see that the same are returned to the Association.

SECTION 6. The Treasurer shall receive and hold all moneys of the Association, subject to the direction of the Executive Committee, and shall make a report at each annual meeting.

SECTION 7. The Executive Committee shall arrange the time and place for each meeting of the Association, and shall see that the same are held in accordance with the constitution.

SECTION 8. The officers of this Association shall be elected annually, in such manner as the Executive Committee may decide, except in case of the Corresponding Secretary, who shall be chosen whenever a vacancy shall occur, or whenever the Society shall decide by a special vote to hold such election.

ARTICLE IV. MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. Meetings of the Association shall be held at least annually, and not oftener than once in three months.

SECTION 2. The annual meeting shall be held on the first day of May, or later than the 20th day of June.

ARTICLE V.

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Society, by a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided only that no amendment shall be made which shall change the name of the Association, or the object thereof.

JNO. FITZGERALD'S GREAT STOCK FARM.

I propose to give the readers of your paper a short sketch of a recent trip to Fitzgerald's stock farm, near Greenwood. A lively turnout took charge of Mr. Fitzgerald and myself, and we were soon on our way with little less speed than the Iron horse. About 3 miles out of town we stopped at a farm house to let a very welcome visitor (a shower) pass. Then on we went through splashing mud. Reaching the summit of a little slope we were in full view of the farm. I gazed in admiration and "like Moses viewed the landscape o'er." A grand outline of Cotton-wood timber, with cross lines of the 160 acres, finely arranged groves and buildings formed a grand sight. The delicate green of the trees contrasted with the darker shades of the different varieties of grain, and newly planted corn; each variety filling a row. The soon reached the entrance lane, the timber had just been plowed, not a weed to be seen, and was trimmed up 6 or 8 feet high. I asked Mr. Fitzgerald how long it had been planted and in what way, he said four years and from cuttings about 8 or 10 inches long stuck in the ground. I saw from the rapid growth that the soil was of the most cultivation this young field had received. The different fields were in as good condition as plow and harrow could make them. We passed a new mass of what was a few days ago a good farm house, but now only a mass of ashes and cinders; after showing his foreman and family the design of a new house, that will be an ornament to the already beautiful farm, we came to the barn. Here is what I come to see, the Short Horn Cattle, the barn only contained but the rest being in the different pastures, they were a dark red color, good size, deep chest, and straight as a line on the back; in fact all were models of the best of the breed. The calves were in a 30 acre lot, and the thoroughbreds were, from 4 to 6 months old. The sight would pay any lover of the stock to go to the Greenwood Farm to see—all stamped with the seal of the State of Nebraska, and this celebrated herd. I was impatient to see the dams of this fine group of calves, passing through the horse pasture, which had a new growth of native grass cultivated with a heavy harrow early in the spring, the cows connect; we were soon surrounded by the finest group of thoroughbreds I ever saw, the quality of the calves were not borrowed from any other breed, but they had it by birthright. The pastures contain about 500 acres all fenced with boards all opening in a general thoroughfare or shaded lane, which leads to the barn. There is a large tank of pure cold water supplied from a well 85 feet deep, and forced there by a "Slover Wind Mill," which is ever doing its duty in storm or calm. The water is pure and sweet, and the fences are all of boards and have the posts sawed off and capped, giving all an appearance of neatness and order on the farm, and while on this subject, neatness, let me say we have become so accustomed to being styled the banner county that if we are not watchful we will lose the name.
