The Use of Paper.

DURE'S AD.

The following statistics of the production and consumption of paper are furnished by a Vieuna Journal: "It appears that there are 3,000 paper manufactories in the world, employing 80,-000 men and 180,000 women, besides the 100,000 employed in the rag trade; 1,800,009,000 pounds of paper are produced annually. One half is used in printing, a sixth for writing, and the remainder for packing and other purposes. The United States average 17 pounds per head; an Englishman consumes 111/2; a German 8 pounds; a Frenchman 7 pounds; an Italian 314 pounds; a Spaniard 11/2 pounds; and a Russian only 1 pound, annually, on an average. This would indicate that Americans are the most extensive reading people in the world .- Electrotype Journal.
