### The United States Supreme Court on the Woman-Suffrage Question.

Reese Happersett, in error to the Superior Court of the State of Missouri, Chief Justice Waite delivered the opinion of the court to the effect that the Fourteenth Amendment of the Constitution does not confer remember how the elephant stood on his pon women the right to vote. The court affirms in the decision that women have always been considered citizens under the Constitution and entitled to all the privileges and immunities of citizenship, but in the admission of this general point the court decides that suffrage is not one of the privileges and immunities of the citizen, and that it is nowhere made so in express terms, and even further than this, that suffrage was not coextensive with the citizenship of the States at the time of its adoption. Applying these general facts to shows that the framers of the Fourteenth Amendment never contemplated that it conferred the right of suffrage even upon the colored persons because it invested them with citizenship, and, taking this view, they framed the Fifteenth Amendment to prevent any State denying them
