OHIO GOES REPUBLICAN, BY 5,000 TO 10,000!

IOWA REPUBLICAN BY 35,000 TO 40,000!

Nebraska State Ticket Republican, 9,090 to 10,000!

There is no doubt scarcely, but that Allen is defeated in Ohio. The Chicago Times heads its telegraphic column, "Billy be damned—that's what Ohio said to Bill Allen yesterday."

Iowa goes Republican by about 40,000, and the Legislature will be largely republican.
Our own State has carried the Republican Judges, Lake, Gantt, and Maxwell, undoubtedly, and most of the District Judges. It is thought that Savage (Dem) in the Omaha district is elected.
Pound, Judge in our district is elected, while Smith, district Attorney, is probably defeated.
Valentine (Rep) is said to be elected in that district. On the whole we have got through very well.
Lancaster polled a very heavy vote. Lincoln gave 300 Republican majority. We may safely say the tidal wave has turned and there are republican gains at large, wherever there was an election Tuesday.

AT HOME.
In Cass County it is pretty safe; we have carried the whole county ticket, except Treasurer, and county Commissioner. Four precincts have not been heard from yet. On Probate Judge it is close, but we think Mr. Newell wins. Our lists above give the majorities. Ramsey (Dem) is elected Commissioner.

ON COUNTY SEAT.
As well as we could hear and estimate, Plattsmouth will hold the county seat on the election. The votes as heard from stands: Plattsmouth, 878; Louisville, 40; Centre, 6; Weeping Water, 622; Rock Bluffs, 136.

Centre gave us one vote, Rock Bluffs 92.
Liberty, a democratic precinct, gave Cutler 2 majority. Moore got a big vote. Smith has over 400 majority in the County.
