THE HERALD'S REPORT ON OUR COAL. LINCOLN, Neb., Feb. 10th, 1878. HOWSEAS GARNER, Governor of NEB. Dear Sir:—In accordance with your instructions I proceeded on Saturday, Feb. 11th to section 17, town 16, N. of range 14 East, in Cass County, Nebraska, to examine a coal mine said to have been discovered at this place.

It was accompanied by Mr. V. M. Horn, the owner of the property, Mr. MacMurphy, and Mr. Black, the miner who had opened the drift at this place. The opening was made near the level of the Missouri flood plain, where the river comes close to the bluffs, and about fifteen feet above the water. Forty-three feet from the entrance the supposed coal was struck, from which point the drift was continued seventy-nine feet further.

The result therefore reached by my examination and analyses is, that the material of their supposed coal is made up of shale so highly laminated as to approach in texture and composition the poorer varieties of cannel coal.

On my way to this place I stopped over night at Rock Bluffs, where on the lower edge of the Missouri bluffs, next to the river, a drift is now being extended into a deposit, which is evidently, from its stratigraphical position, the geological equivalent of the one mined on Vanbom's land.
