OUR HOME LETTER.

The town is looking up, business improving, houses scarce and rent to rent.

The B. & M. R. Road is doing a heavy business, averaging about one hundred cars per day each way. Last Friday the Transfer crossed one hundred and thirty-seven loaded cars going east.

The new R. R. Shop are progressing rapidly, the contractor is working all the men he can put upon the walls. The new shop will make a fine addition to our City.

The M. & M. building or machine shop has one hundred and sixty feet long by sixty wide. The blacksmith shop forty by sixty. The round house to contain sixty stalls, the old carpenter shops to be used this winter and replaced by new ones in the spring.

The Depot is to be moved to the foot of Main street, where it should have a fine front.
