The republican cauldron is now beginning to boil in "Old Kass." It is said that there are thirteen candidates for sheriff on the republican side. A baker's dozen is surely *quantum sufficit*, and when more are announced we surely must exclaim, "Oh! the frailty of man." The greenbackers are organizing throughout the county. A large club is now successfully organized at Rock Bluffs and hold meetings every fortnight. Of the the twenty-four hundred voters in Cass County at least one-sixth are greenbackers, and they seem disposed to, fight it out with a straight ticket. Party lines have been thoroughly broken in Cass County. The old leaders of the Republican party have been thrust aside, and new leaders are at the helm. These new leaders do not command the confidence of the party, yet through some sort of legerdemain they have been enabled to carry a majority of their nominees.

The prospect is that warm times are ahead in the republican ranks.

We haven't seen any cauldron. There never was any thirteen candidates for Sheriff; every body knows there are Greenbackers in Cass County; the whole Republican party here is a greenback party; those particularly shouting themselves hoarse, for Greenbacks will vote with the Democrats. —they always do—Party lines were never strong in Cass. [The proof is that for the first time in years the Democracy propose to run a straight democratic ticket, refusing to join with any Independent or Greenback move]. The old leaders have not been thrown aside if the ticket is any criterion and they do command the confidence of the people as the vote will show; and the prospect ahead is that there will be warm times for the Louisville convention and the ticket they may put up—which shows that Ramsey cannot tell the truth even when it would help his party to tell the truth.
