Ordered that the county surveyor be and is hereby ordered to survey and locate bridges at the following places. To-wit: One across Weeping Water, near the N. E. corner of section four, town 10, range 11, on the Lincoln road; one across the Weeping Water at a point known as the Gyger bridge; two bridges across Greenwood Creek at the points where said creek crosses the section line running between sections twenty-seven and twenty-eight in Salt Creek precinct; one on Camp Creek on line between section 5 and 6, town 10, range 10; one across Callahan Creek on the township line between 11 and 12 on section 1, town 11, range 9; one across Little Pawnee Creek on sec. 28, on the road running from Louisville to South Bend.

The reconstruction of D. H. Wheeler and others against the call for the election for the relocation of the County Seat of Cass County, Nebraska, is hereby dissolved.
