Facts and Figures. For the purpose of affording information to our readers concerning the vote of Cass County, there being a great amount of wild figuring done on the County Seat business, we give the vote of the County by precincts for the last three elections. This, together with the census we publish also, will give a very good basis for estimating the county vote in the coming election.

In the year 1875 we voted for Co. and also on Co. seat removal. In 1876 the vote here given is on Electors; the vote for State Senator that year in a few precincts exceeded these figures; the average is about right. Last fall's vote was upon Co. Ordinance.

Home Work. We cannot help but call attention to the lack of home support our people often give to the few and struggling manufacturing institutions we have among us. These we do have need all the encouragement you can give them.

Within a few days facts like these have come to our knowledge. Mr. John Wayman as every one ought to know runs a foundry up here; where he makes every possible kind of casting almost that can be made. Stove tops, plates, grates, bolts, bars, slabs, pillars, columns, stove fronts, farm machinery of all kinds, and as we have said almost literally everything that can be cast out of iron and needed in a community like this. It has taken years of hard work to build this up, to keep work here. It has taken money to advertise this fact and keep it before the people, and to fight hard times, and yet many through carelessness, or willfulness, will send work to Omaha or elsewhere, often paying bigger prices for poorer work, seemingly because they would rather help an outsider than their own people. Only a few days ago a farmer wanted a piece of machinery at one, and telegraphed to Omaha. He was unable to get it there, and finally came to Wayman, when for less cost than the telegraph and freight and in shorter time, he received his work in good shape and was pleased with it.
