Plattsmouth Library and Reading Room Association.

This Association shall be called the Plattsmouth Library and Reading Room Association.

RULES.

1. Any person may become a member of this Association by paying into the treasury annually the sum of two dollars in advance, and shall thereupon be entitled to all the privileges of the Association.
2. The library shall be open for the giving out and returning of books every afternoon, except Sunday.
3. Every member of the Association, and all persons not members, shall be entitled to draw not exceeding two volumes at a time from the library, such volume or volumes to be returned within two weeks.
4. Any person not a member of the association shall for the privileges of the library pay twenty-five cents a month, and shall be subject in all respects to the same rules as members.
5. No person shall be allowed to draw additional books until those previously taken out are returned.
6. Strangers sojourning for days in the town can have the use of the library subject to the same conditions as members, by depositing with the librarian the value of the book or books, which deposit shall be refunded by the librarian on the return of such books, after deducting 10 cents per volume for the use of the same.
7. All damages to books beyond reasonable wear and tear shall be paid by the person drawing the same from the library, damage to be assessed by the librarian.
8. All books shall be returned to the desk of the librarian who shall keep a regular account of every book taken out and returned, in a check book kept for that purpose.
9. Persons living at a distance from town may be allowed to retain books for a period of three weeks, subject however to all the other rules of the library.
10. Periodicals may be taken out subject to the same rules as books after having been in the Reading Room four weeks.

The State Fair drew a great crowd and the display of fine horses and cattle was very good, also of machinery and wagons. It was not on the whole equal to last year. 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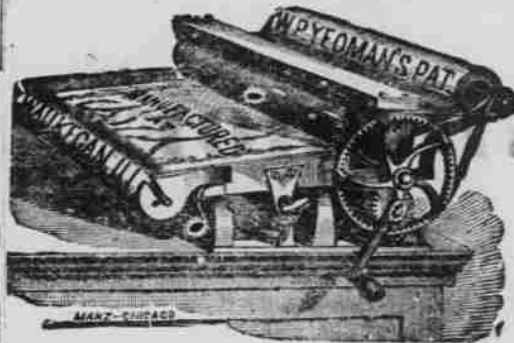
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
