The curious and novel experiment of Mr. Frank Morrison in the boat line was tried last week, the boat moved up to the Bayou, and those who saw it feel confident of its success. In connection with this we print the following:

A CURIOUS MACHINE.

A curious machine has been invented by Professor Balsamo, of Lecce, Italy, by means of which vessels are propelled without resource being had to screw or rudder. The efficiency of this new propeller has been tested by means of a miniature model to which it was applied. Though small, this vessel, constructed by the Professor himself, was modeled on the type of the largest ironclad afloat, and was furnished with furnace, cylinder with piston, steam condenser, feeding pumps, etc. The secret of the new propeller was not disclosed, no further being given than that it is not to allow the course of the vessel to be altered in the virtue of the passive resistance of the surface of the rubber, but in the virtue of the motive force varying according to the resultant motion required, thus utilizing nearly the whole live force developed by the engine.

There Frank, you don't use big words

enough, if you would state that the circumambient fluid which accumulates in the periphery of the cylindrical space approximates to your boilers was moved by the force of genius and utilized as a resultant motion, you would have a big thing.

Sealed proposals in triplicate, subject to the usual conditions, will be received at this office, until 12 o'clock, noon, on Wednesday, December 3, 1878, at which place and time they will be opened in the presence of the Board of Commissioners, and delivered, in quantities as required up to June 30, 1879, at Omaha Depot, Nebraska, or at stations on the Union Pacific Railroad eastward from Kearney Junction, one million (1,000,000) pounds Oats, and two millions (2,000,000) pounds Corn.

Proposals for quantities less than the whole required, will be received. Preference will be given to articles of domestic production.

The contracts will be let with the provision that the quantities contracted for may be increased or reduced one third by the Chief Quartermaster of the Department, at any time within sixty days after date of contract.

Bids should state the rate per 100 pounds, not per bushel; should state the year in which the Corn proposed to be furnished was grown, and should be enclosed on envelopes, "Bids for Grain."
