with exp was decided to grant to one Henry Browning the job of cleaning and coating the monolith with a solution of his own invention. The effect, says the Times has exceeded

the most sanguine expectations of the Board of Works. In operating upon the granite Mr. Browning first gave it a thorough cleansing, removing all the sooty and greasy matters from the surface, and inducated it with his invisible preservative solution. The effect has been to give a freshness to the granite as if only just chiscled from the rock, retaining the original color, disclosing the several veins, the white spar shining in the sun's rays like crystals, and exhibiting the polished portions as they formerly existed. More than this, the "intaglio," or the hieroglyphic engravings, come out far more pointedly than before, and the injuries the stone has received are now plainly distinguishable from the hierogryphics. The solution soaks well into the pores of the granite, and the best authorities consider that it will have the effect of thoroughly preserving the monolith for centuries yet to come.

Seventeen Thousand Boxes.

The London correspondent of a Liver-

pool paper says: "The labors of the Queen are more onerous than those who look upon Royalty as a round of pleasure may believe. ### Physical Action of Turpentine on Workmen.

At a recent sitting of the Academy of Sciences of Paris, a paper on the subject was read by Dr. Poincaire, a professor attached to the Faculty of Sciences at Nancy, who has had occasion to study the effects of turpentine on 284 painters coming under his observation. From his researches in this direction, and from comparative experiments made upon various animals, Dr. Poincarre arrives at the conclusion that the injurious effects produced by turpentine fumes can never be sufficiently severe to cause death, unless they be volatilized in an extremely contin d space. Where there are free movement of the air and good ventilation, there need be no tear whatever of fatal accidents from this cause. He further remarks that the vapors of turpentine coming from different sources have not all the same energy; that of the French product, for instance, being far less injurious than those of Hungarian or American turpentines. Lastly, such evil effects as are produced are mostly in the cases of workined unused to the trade, a very short time sufficing to case-harden or acctimatize


