General Grant. An escort of the Grand Army of the Republic left Omaha Thursday afternoon in the Pullman car Humboldt to receive and welcome Gen. Grant. Gen. C. F. Manderson was commander and Capt. J. S. Wood adjutant.

The party met the General at Cheyenne, and returned to Omaha, reaching there Saturday about 2 p. m., as before stated.

On the road down crowds welcomed the distinguished man at every station. In the evening a camp-fire, as it is called, was lit, and stories of the war circulated freely. After Gen. Manderson, Paul Vandervoort and others had spoken, Gen. Grant was called for, and made quite a speech, giving the following reminiscence of army days:

"After the surrender of Lee, I hurried back to Washington with all haste, to stop the enormous expenditures the government was at that time making in the way of purchases, enlistments and drafting—while I was not positive that there would be no further hostilities, and no further effort made on the part of the rebel armies—yet I thought it was unlikely there would be, but thought it was better to take proper precautions. So I ordered the Army of the James to go back to Bart's Station, to remain there while we could go on to Washington to do as I said, to stop the expenditures that were being made. An you all remember, the authorities in Richmond had taken flight, and they never stopped till they got to Danville (great laughter). Finding we were not pursuing them, they'd stop there, supposing I was at Bart's Station. "Extra" Billy Smith, as he was called, who was governor of Virginia at that time, sent a letter through by flag of truce to me, which Gen. Meade received, and without letting them know that I was not there, telegraphed it to me at Washington. It was to this effect: He was governor of the commonwealth of Virginia, and as such he had temporarily removed the seat of government from Richmond to Danville (laughter) and he was desirous of knowing from me whether he would be permitted to exercise the functions of his office in Danville unimpeded, or if not, if he and a few friends would be permitted to leave the country. I was to return to the best answer to send, when I happened to meet Mr. Lincoln on the sidewalk and told him about it. He supposed I was asking him for instructions. "I will tell you how it is," he said; "it is like an Irishman I once heard of who was in the habit of drinking whisky, and had been for a long time. He joined the temperance society, but the habit of drinking was strong upon him. He wanted to take something, and so for a while he took soda water. One day, however, he held his glass around and said, "Doctor, can't you put a drop of brandy in that unbeknownst to me?" (Great laughter.) Mr. Lincoln couldn't have said any plainer than that, that "Extra" Billy Smith could have leave to take as many of that sort of drinks as he pleased." (Great laughter.)

As they neared Omaha Senators Saunders and Padlock, and Congressman Valentine went out on a special train to Fremont and met the party.

AT OMAHA. They were welcomed by Gen. Crook, Mayor Chase, and Governor Nance, and escorted to Capitol Hill, where speeches were made by Gov. Nance, Mayor Chase and others.

Gen. Grant responded in a short speech. From there they were driven to the government court house where a hand-shaking reception took place. Three thousand people, it is estimated, shook hands with General and Mrs. Grant.

IN THE EVENING. A banquet was held at the Withnell, Gen. Manderson, Senator Padlock, Senator Saunders spoke and Gen. Grant again answered the toasts and speeches briefly.

Delegations from Lincoln, Fremont, Plattsmouth, all the State officers, many newspaper men from abroad, and an immense crowd of people were present in the afternoon.

Twenty-five thousand people participated in the celebration, and Omaha justly feels proud.

It was unquestionably a great reception, a grand ovation from the State of Nebraska to our country's foremost citizen, the greatest general of the age and the most wonderful man in many respects that the world has ever produced.

Obituary. SOUTH BEND, October 22, 1878.
