The McKenna Mine.

This mine is situated about two and a half or three miles northwest of Custer and is one of the substantial mines of Custer county. The mine comes in a different shape than what we suppose, and is much more irregular. The mine is surrounded by a large rock in every direction, and is quarried out like common lime stone and all of it from the surface down is of No. 1 quality. Mr. McKenna now employs a half dozen men in the mine and many more in the shop where the mica is sorted, cut and packed ready for shipment. At present only two cutting machines are used, but in order to supply the demand Mr. McKenna has ordered another which will be ready in a few days. The mine is situated on the summit of a large hill, and on every side the mine can be seen cropping out for at least 15,000 feet. This mine is equal to any gold mine of 20 stamp mills, all the capital required is small, compared with the amount of money to be invested in getting up a mine of this size.
