### INDIAN AFFAIRS.

The Sioux Indians are still on the war path, and they are committing depredations to quite an alarming extent on the North Platte river, in the western part of the State. Reports are very contradictory, but enough is shown to prove that they are not to be put off by peace ful measures. Mr. Frank Appleton. acting Indian agent, at a point 60 miles from Ft. Laramie, was murdered a short time ago. A train containing arms and ammunition, furnished by the Interior Department, has been ordered to report at Ft. Laramie. The report that Red Willow has been burned, and Mr. Reval Buck, one of the oldest citizens has been murdered by the Indians, lacks confirm-

Senator Hitchcock has introduced bill into Congress to the effect "That so much of said treaty of April twenty ninth, eighteen hundred and sixty eight, as might, by any such construction, allow said Sioux Indians to reside in or roam and hunt over any portion of the State of Nebraska, or as might exclude white men from traveling over, of settling upon any pertion of said State, is hereby abrogated and void."

We trust our government will spare no pains to protect its citizens on the frontier, and give the Indians to understand that they cannot harm unoffend ing settlers with impunity. We wish the Indian all the rights to which he is entitled, but we do not believe in feeding and clothing bim, and then receive nothing but the work of the torch and tomahawk in return. We hope that the military organization in our State will put down these outrages.

#### Western Representation.

We are glad to see the interest manifested to secure the additional representative in Congress, to which we seem clearly to be entitled. Our widely extended territory, larger than several of the eastern states combined; our varied interests, too varied for one man properly to attend to; and our numerous and rapidly increasing population, as numerous as the constituents of two or three eastern Congressmen; all so imperatively and clearly demand additional representation, that, if proper effort is made, it is more than probably it will be successful.

We are also thankful to the Omaha Republican, Senator Gwyer, Gov. Furnas Son Caspor, and othere, who have interested themselves in this matter, in behalf of the interests of the newer and western portion of the State.

But, there is another phase of the subject still more directly important to us. It is increased and adequate representation in State affairs! Increased representation in Congress is important. But this is overshadowingly more im-
