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We regret to learn that a portion of J. Q. Potter's dam on the river broke the large body in the pond behind the ice from above and made a very large gorge which threw the water around on the land into the pond below and soon raised the ice in the pond which ran over the dam without doing any damage, but in the afternoon of Saturday, the gorge above broke and the ice and water came down in such a mass that it swept everything before it, carrying away about 150 feet of the dam, which Mr. Potter proposes to replace as soon as possible. He estimates his damage at nearly \$2,000.

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
