Some little trouble is experienced from the undefined boundaries between the two schools. Some of the primary scholars seem to have promoted themselves into the grammar school. As it is now the two schools are independent of each other. It occurrs to us that it would be more satisfactory if the Principal of the higher school were given the supervis ion of both. The primary school would then work in harmony with the grammar school, and somebody beside the pupils would determine whether they were worthy of promotion.

The building is a very comfortable and commodious structure and al though too small to accommodate all the children in the district, is suffici ently large for the grammar school. It is well furnished, with desks, seats, blackboard and other apparatus. At the last annual meeting a tax was inposed to provide books of reference, and additional apparatus. The windows, however, are without curtains, which is a serious drawback to the school Last summer, we believe, some cheap curtains were procured, which were hardly thought worth protecting.
