Proceedings of the Webster County Republican Convention.

Meeting called to order by the chairman of the county central committee. G. W. K. Knight chosen chairman, and A. L. Burton secretary. Proceeded to ballot for County Clerk, J. A. Tulleys received 36 votes, E. H. Jones 12 and O. R. Downs 2. E. H. Jones was nominated by acclamation for the office of Treasurer.

For county commissioner 34 district L. H. Luce received 36 votes, Thos. Kennedy 15. In the formal ballot for sheriff, M. H. Warner received 22 votes, J. D. Post 27, and H. C. Scott 2. J. D. Post was declared elected.

For County Judge J. B. Potter received 32 votes, Wilcox 17 and L. W. Tulleys 2.

For County Surveyor W. E. Thorne received 38 votes, F. H. Brigham 11 and O. Downs 1.

On motion A. A. Pope was nominated as candidate for County Superintendent by acclamation.

On motion B. K. Sherer was unanimously nominated as candidate for County Coroner.

J. S. Giham, M. L. Thomas J. R. Wilcox and A. L. Burton were elected delegates to the State convention.

The following named persons were elected a county central committee. J. L. Miller Red Cloud, G. Scott Harmony, T. J. Ward, Stillwater, J. McCallum, Glenwood, F. M. Snow, Potsdam, J. Granger Batin.

E. O. Parker, Guide Rock, G. W. Knight, Inavale, R. B. Fulton, Walnut Creek, T. C. Laird, Oak Creek.

Mr. Ed.—Having a few leisure moments I concluded to drop a few lines. Everything is prospering very well as usual, the farmers are getting pretty well through with their work and all are making preparations for winter.

Sixty names were chosen from which to elect jurors for the Oct. term of Court 1877.

At the request of citizens of Guide Rock Precinct it is ordered that an election be had at the time of holding the general election in November to vote on the proposition to authorize the county commissioners, at the time of the annual levy in 1878, to levy a tax of one per cent on the assessed valuation of the county for 1878, for the purpose of aiding in the construction of a bridge across the Republican river at some point in Guide Rock Precinct. The order calling an election for the above named purpose passed Aug. 24th 1877 is hereby revoked. Petition of A. J. Rennecker for liquor license was presented and laid over till next meeting.

The Treasurer made a report of receipts and expenditures from May 1st to Oct. 1st 1877 which was approved. Adjourned till 9 a. m. to-morrow.
