Sidney is to have a new paper—a branch of The Fremont Tribune.

On Saturday 33 emigrants came across the river at Nebraska City.

The annual peacock flocks are getting in their usual work through gales lessened.

Subscriptions have been taken for the erection of a Catholic church at Grafton.

Sutton dealers had 25,000 bushels of grain on hand at once, a few days ago.

Hastings has been entertained of late by a Grand Island dramatic association.

A wagon manufactured at the pottery took the first premium at the State fair.

Over twelve hundred head of cattle were taken out of Pawnee county last week.

Up to the 3d of the month, 100 cars of cattle had been shipped from Plum Creek.

The county seat of Adams county has got around to Hastings again. This time permanently.

The B. & M. Railroad Company have added \$16,000 to the treasury of York county for taxes.

Grand Island is lively and more buildings in course of construction at present than any previous time this season.

The Odd Fellows of Aurora held their third annual festival on Friday evening, October 1st.

Mail service between Hebron and Bloomington has been increased from two to three trips per week.

There are more land seekers in Gage county, and more buildings going up than for the last five years.

A new flouring mill is to be erected at Rock Ford near Riverton, by J. H. Ladd, of Lima, Indiana.

A flock of 4,000 sheep destined for an Eastern market, are being prepared on the prairie adjoining Sutton.

Immense lots of lumber are at Hastings awaiting transportation to points along the line of the new road.

It is expected that trains will be running on the railroad from Brownville to Nemaha City in about thirty days.

The grain buyers of De Witt, Sac-Vine county, report the grain trade better this fall than was ever known there.

Nemaha county exhibited at the State fair 164 varieties of apples, 51 of peaches—48 being seedlings—and 43 of pears.

Messrs. Holmes & Co., of Omaha, have purchased the Nebraska City distillery, and will at once put it in running order.

Red Cloud will be the grain market for several northern counties of Kansas, as soon as the railroad is completed to this point.

The farmers in the Hagan neighborhood, Lincoln county, are building a stone school-house. There are 15 scholars in the district.

Large quantities of grain are being received at Syracuse, with but few cars to transport it. The grain-houses are rapidly becoming full.

The town of Alexandria, Thayer county, is named after its founder, Hon. S. J. Alexander, Republican candidate for Secretary of State.

Mr. C. W. Wheeler of Brownville, has an apple tree, of the Red June variety, that has its second crop of this season nearly matured.

There is not a dead town in Nebraska this fall, and building in the country is much brisker than it has ever been this time of the year.

Big hogs are on time this fall. Mr. G. M. Anderson, of Platte county, sold a two-year-old Chester White last week that weighed 700 pounds.

The wheat market at Columbus was glutted on Friday, every elevator and warehouse being filled to overflow on account of the scarcity of ears.

Each week brings to Boone Co. a larger invoice of strangers than the week previous. All are alike pleased with the county and its brilliant prospects.

The commissioners of Thayer county have decided to build in connection with Nuckells county, a bridge across the Little Blue, on the line between the two counties.

According to the assessor's returns there is but one county in the state that raised more wheat in 1877 than York county. Saunders county returned a little less than 1,000 more than York.

Mr. J. F. Dentecoff, of Hamilton county, was stopped by five men and robbed of \$50 dollars, a few days ago while on his way home from Central City, where he had been to sell a load of wheat.
