throughout the country.

GUIDE ROCK.

—Wm. Sawyer lives down on the
bottom south of the village and his
one of the richest farms in the country.

He is one of the men—the very few
who have paid in advance for the fair
paper. Also sends a copy to his father
in Law.

—J. B. Watts makes his home and
shading place south of the river.

Has a good farm but has been unable
until the last year to cultivate it very
extensively. He raised some good pota-
toes, to which we can testify, as they
fit our taste most admirably.

—John Shelton, one of the first
settlers in the country, and one who
raised the first wheat grown here,
has made a comfortable home about
two miles south of town. His house,
a species of adobe—made by setting
rocks in the ground a short distance
apart, braiding willow bushes around
them and plastering both inside and
out with clay, previously mixed to a
stiff mortar with hay, cut to the length
of two inches, and water—is very
comfortable, neat, clean, cheap and
durable.
