There is much talk about woman suffrage and so many seem favorably inclined that it is thought by many that the legislature will amend the constitution to that respect and submit it to a vote of the people.

This session is more than half completed, and yet the revision of the statutes is but half begun. It is thought that the governor will call an extra session for the purpose of completing the work should they not finish during this.

The bill providing for a State Reform School has been referred to a joint committee, composed of the Senate committee on Education and the House committee on Common Schools and Normal Schools and Universities. Senator Wiggin is chairman of the joint committee.

The Cincinnati Musical Festival Association have offered a prize of \$1000 for the best original composition for orchestra and chorus to be performed at their Festival next year. Competition limited to native Americans.

The joint Congressional committee to consider the advisability of transferring the Indian Bureau from the Department of Interior to that of War, voted on the subject and found themselves locked, 4 to 4. They will meet again soon. Senator Saunders voted against it.

Southern papers are making a great time about the burning in Western Nebraska. But they do not say any thing of the promptness by which the guilty parties have been brought to justice and are having their just deserts meted out to them. Southern outlaws will find Nebraska too hot for them yet.

Considerable excitement is being caused by the construction put upon certain clauses in the revised statutes by Attorney General Dilworth, and the investigation going on in regard to ex-Treasurer McRide. It appears that he holds certificates of deposits for large sums of money from different banks in the State, and whether the treasurer has done anything contrary to law, or has appropriated anything to personal use, is what the legislature is now trying to find out.

We have no judgment in the matter but await the action of the committee trusteeing for the sake of our state and the supposed faithful officer, that all will be correct.

The following is the text of a bill for an act to prohibit the traffic in intoxicating liquors or beverage. It is enacted by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska.

SEC. 1. That no person shall be allowed to sell, give away, or in any manner dispose of, by himself, his agent, or employee, any intoxicating liquor in a drink or beverage. All malt liquors, wine, and all distilled spirits, and all compound or combination of any of these shall be considered intoxicating liquor within the meaning of this act.

SEC. 2. Any person engaged in the sale of intoxicating liquors for mechanical, chemical, or sacramental purposes, or for any other purposes than those prohibited in section one of this act, shall, before engaging in such sale, enter into an obligation with at least two sufficient sureties to be appointed by the Clerk of at least one District Court of the county where the business is to be carried on, conditioned that he will not sell in the manner and for the purpose prohibited in said section one, which obligation may be as follows:

We——, as principal, and——, as sureties, acknowledge ourselves to owe and be indebted into the County of——, and State of Nebraska, in the sum of one thousand dollars, to be levied upon and each of our goods and chattels, lands, and tenements, if default be made in the following conditions, to wit: The conditions of this obligation is such that if the said blank shall not sell, give away, or in any manner dispose of, by himself, his agent, or employee any intoxicating liquor as a drink or beverage, then this obligation to be void, else to remain in force.

(Signed.)

The remaining sections provide for the penalties and their prosecutions.
