The Solid South now stands by itself on its own issues. Since 1864 the North has been unwilling to consider our Southern brethren as ready to set up a form of government to antagonize the union, but at Cincinnati, Wade Hampton made a bid for the Solid South, and they must now lie in it. The North now understands just what the "Solid South mean."

The chief of the Bureau of Statistics finds an illustration of the old statement "Westward the star of empire takes its way," in the fact that during three months ending Sept. 30, 154,832 immigrants arrived at our ports, being an increase of 86,181 over the same period of last year. During the same months this year 8,862 foreigners visited this country. These immigrants, for the most part, are in possession of means sufficient to establish themselves in business or purchase homes and thus the country is becoming enriched not only in its labor but in its material wealth. These new comers buy through tickets in every country in Europe to their places of destination in Nebraska, New Mexico, Texas, Dakota or any portion of the West. With stability in government affairs, every foot of available land in our vast heretofore American desert will be utilized and occupied before the great hour hand on our dial plate of destiny shall have tolled off the close of the 19th century. With such a prospect before us, with what confidence we may weave the warp and woof of our opening blossoming into a future of accomplishments, such as never was dreamed of by our fathers.

Washington Monument is now being pushed forward towards completion. A meeting of the Society was held a few days since on top of the monument, 184 feet in height—fourteen feet higher than it was when the work was recommended. Three courses of marble and backing were taken off at the start and replaced with new, making altogether twenty feet of new work. The meeting expressed thanks to Congress for the appropriations under which the work has been done, and confidence that, sympathizing with the patriotic sentiments of the people of the country, Congress will make appropriations necessary to insure the rapid completion of the monument. Col. Casey hopes to have the shaft 209 feet high before cold weather.

Thomas Hayes, a former living fifteen miles southwest of Fremont, committed suicide last week. No reason for the act are assigned.

Thursday night last, the safe of C. H. Pinkham, at South Bend, was blown open by burglars, who got away with a considerable sum.

Frank Van Gordon was seriously injured at the North Platte machine shops last week by the falling of a heavy iron plate on one of his legs.

The fourteen-year-old daughter of Frank Crow, of Oakdale, is missing. She is five feet high, dark complexion, hair and eyes, lively in talk and disposition.

A man and a boy named Allen and Lewis Loft, and living on the Upper Leaver, were caught in the storm of two weeks ago, while out hunting and were frozen to death. Their dead bodies were found last week and buried.

A man who was recently found murdered near Chapman is thought to be an individual who was recently in Central City looking up the prospects of locating a stock farm near town. He is said to have had \$12,000 with him.

A railroad transfer boat is to be put in at Spring Hill, about six miles below Nemaha city. The boat has already arrived and is making soundings for landings, channels, &c.

It is not probable that the new capitol wing at Lincoln will be completed before the first of January, and it will not be ready for occupancy until long after that time.

Isaac Henry, who has had a suit pending against the Union Pacific company for the loss of a leg, which was run over by a car, has been offered \$5,000 by the Union Pacific to compromise the case.

Captain Eads' Clip Railway.
The Scientific American of this week contains two full page illustrations of Captain Eads' proposed railway for transporting ships with their cargo across continents.

Captain Eads claims by his plan to be able to take loaded ships of the largest tonnage from one ocean to the other across the Isthmus of Panama, as readily as can be done by a canal, after the Lessip plan, and at a much less cost for engineering construction.

The project is certainly bold and ingenious, and the projector anticipates serious difficulties in carrying forward his enterprise. The engravings referred to in the Scientific American show the proposed construction of not only the railroad, but the appliances for transferring the ships from the water to the rail.

OUR WASHINGTON LETTER.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 12, 1880.

EDITOR CHIEF:—The people of the loyal North marched boldly to the discharge of their highest duty on election day, under the benignant smiles of Providence, who vouchsafed a balmy air and golden sunshine, shimmering with the autumnal haze of an Indian Summer day. Never were citizens of any land called to duties more solemn, momentous or exalted. Right well and nobly was the battle fought and a long-drawn sigh of relief burst forth from every patriotic heart when the work was done, as the news of victory came flashing over the electric wires. It was the fall of Richmond and the surrender at Appomattox repeated again, fifteen years after those notable events. It was a reconsecration to loyalty and to God, made by a people who know what sacrifice mean, and who have a keen appreciation of the glorious thing it is for men to die for country and yet think it not less noble to live, act and vote, so that the country itself may not die. To the world it presented the spectacle of a great loyal people riding upon the topmost wave of commercial prosperity, the like of which was never known, speaking in a voice louder than booming cannon on the surging waves of old ocean—saying, labor shall be protected, business activities shall be fostered men's rights
