The editor of the *Argus* calls upon the *CHIEF* man to "publish to the world the fact that the county levy in Webster county during the past two years has been reduced thirty-three mills." This we would be glad to do if we knew or believe it to be a fact, but considering that it has been an absolute impossibility to get a statement of any kind from the county officers in regard to the county levy, notwithstanding the fact that the law requires it of them, we do not propose to become a party to false representations of county matter as the editor of the *Argus* has done. Admitting, for the sake of argument, that the county officers have reduced the tax levy in two years 33 cents, the fact remains that during the five years' previous the same officers raised the levy to more than forty cents! We have before stated that it has been the policy of the county officers to reduce the levy every two years—just prior to an election, and for the next year double it to make up for what was lost in their efforts to gain a re-election. This scheme is well understood by a great many taxpayers.

If, however, it can be shown that the powers that be have really reduced the levy for other than political purposes, then no one will be more ready to publish the fact to the world than the *CHIEF*. In the mean time we still demand a thorough setting up of the county's business that we all may know just how the county stands financially, and know whether this boasted reduction of the tax levy is a bona-fide reduction. We in common with a majority of the taxpayers of Webster county anxiously await a settlement of the county's affairs and the publication of a correct statement of its financial condition.

## For the Women's Column.

Those who failed to attend Mr. Correll's lecture, missed something pleasant to hear, even if they do not believe as he does. He told us some new things, and brought to mind some old ones. His style is vigorous, forcible and positive, it carries conviction to the hearts of his many hearers.

Mrs. Wittenmeyer, the Temperance lecturer, was present, and it seems from her own story that she once was a suffragist, but has lately "fallen from grace" (the first instance of such a fall in this cause I have ever known.) She was called upon for a speech, but declined it being too late for a discussion. In a little talk with a few after the close of the meeting, she gave a reason for her change of views. She said, "There are three classes of women, one the first and best, contains those who are bright, smart, and intellectual, who inform themselves on all the questions of the day and who are ever ready for any good word and work. They will vote. The middle and by far the most numerous class, consists of those whose minds are entirely occupied with home affairs, you ask them to go to a lecture, or to attend a meeting for public improvement, and they will excuse themselves, something after this manner, "Jimmy's socks have got to be darned," "Susan's apron finished," "or the pickles and preserves must be attended to," or, "I have got so much to do, I can't get time to go." Even I cannot reach them. They would never vote. The third class, the low and vile would vote and outnumber the good ones.

"But" said one, "I think that middle class can be reached by the ballot."

"Oh! no," said she, "it has been tried."

"Where?"

"In New Jersey."

"Of more than a hundred years ago. We have progressed since then," said one man.

"It has been tried in Wyoming," said Mr. Correll, "and all the good women vote."

"That is not a fair test," said she, "but we could not find out why it is not a fair test. She probably judges of the west by her knowledge of some eastern state."

I agree with her, in her opinion of the first class, but it is a more numerous class in this state than the last one she mentions.

The middle and indifferent class we have, I know but I think they can be reached. I can give you an instance where one of them has already been brought out to vote at a school meeting.

In a town not a hundred miles from here, the ladies (who had been much dissatisfied with the school board) thought they would take advantage of the new school law and try a little temperance man. There was a lady whom they had no thought of asking to go to the school meeting to help them, because she was so devoted to her home affairs.

But her husband who belonged to the other party, hearing by chance what the women intended doing, said, "If those women are going to the school meeting to vote, my wife can go too."

The ladies were surprised to see him come into the meeting accompanied by his wife. She took a seat with the other ladies and when they commenced to ballot, he went to her and said, "Mary here is a ticket for you to vote. I have prepared it for you." "Keep it yourself," said she, "I have my ticket already, I shall vote as these ladies do." He wisely said nothing to her, but went off muttering to himself "Well my vote will kill her anyway."

Another story has been told me by a woman who has lived in Wyoming. In a certain town, nearly all the ladies who voted were republicans and influential temperance workers. But there was one whose husband was a democrat, and she also leaned that way herself, she did not care about voting, but her husband and his democratic friends induced her to go to the polls, and tried to impress upon her mind that it was her duty to vote as they did, but every time, when she got there she would vote the republican ticket. This shows also that women have a greater influence over their own sex for good, than a great many men do.

There was a man in Grand Island who had said and written a great deal against woman suffrage and temperance, but he happened to want to get elected to the school board last spring, and he went all over the town with his carriage on the day of the school meeting, gathering up the women to go and vote for him, and he did not get the temperance women either. It was this middle class he brought in, but he did not get elected after all.
