Washington Correspondence.

Washington, March 23, 1882.

The T. P. Rowland committee has reported 145 of its constituents last week.

The small box is reported to be making terrible havoc in certain parts of Pennsylvania.

One of the recently discovered T. P. Rowland letters is said to have \$10,000 in government bonds.

\$25,000 collected from the stock of Helena Advertisers are on the Pacific and that half furnished by the government.

The St. Louis at Omaha have become more orderly and quiet but the soldiers have not been withdrawn, and it is uncertain when they will be.

It is said that a handsome sum has been subscribed for Sergeant Mason's family by the government employees of the various departments at Washington.

The family operations of the Lacey mine, Mass., will have struck for higher wages claiming that they cannot live honestly on sixty-eight cents a day.

The Apache Indians are again on the war path in New Mexico, and the soldiers are after them with the intention of making it as badly as possible for the painted devils.

The sum of \$10,000 has already been given for the purpose of erecting a monument over the grave of General Garfield, and the committee last week the matter in hand are loudly asking for more.

The holder of the half ticket No. 7514 which drew the grand prize of \$20,000 at the last monthly drawing of the Louisiana state lottery, became insane and has been sent to the county poor house.

The State Journal has cultured and cleaned an entire new dress of type, and now appears as the best daily in the State. The weekly Journal is about half a page and other periodicals are being published for all classes and should be found in every Nebraska home.

The B. & M. in Nebraska has been held in session at Red Cloud, Webster county. A forty-sixth anniversary has been observed and 14 substantial machine shops in addition to the division offices will be located there. It proposes a boom for Red Cloud and the road seems to be well satisfied with its choice—Richard Hendon.

M. F. Dixon of Chicago started at Washington last Saturday with a petition for the pardon of Sergeant Mason. The petition is 220 feet long and is said to contain 120,000 names. It is elaborately gotten up, and is signed by two expert penmen, hanging two hours to fold it properly. The 76th Ohio's Sergeant Mason fund amounts to \$20.

A Vermont man was hanged at Tampan N. Y. last week, two shades less in the court house yard while the United States court was in session. A company of soldiers were ordered out to receive the prisoner from the mob but were too late to do the young man any good, for his wind was effectively shut off before the soldiers got there. The crime for which he was hanged was the carrying of a young girl with a butcher knife.

The flood on the lower Mississippi is unabated and the suffering among those rendered homeless and destitute by the high water is said to be terrible. The government is issuing rations and otherwise providing for the needy. The clerk of the steamer Natchez says, "Matters are a good deal worse than on the last trip. Stock is in a terrible condition. On every little knoll in the overgrown district you see thirty or forty cattle and sometimes several dead ones lying beside their living companions. Cattle are literally eating their alive. On one part of the levee on the down trip there was a pile of wood about half submerged, and on top of it were twenty sheep and a large number of dogs that have taken refuge from the water, but they would starve."
