The Indian war in Arizona promises to develop into stirring propositions if not speedily checked.

There has been a serious Indian outbreak in Arizona, and a number of innocent families are being killed. The soldiers are after the rebels, but it is usual to keep a few behind them that there is no danger of a collision.

The new B & M time table went into effect at noon last Sunday. By it we notice that an additional number of trains will lay over at Red Cloud every night, making in all eight arrivals of trains daily, six remaining over night here.

As attempt was made last week on the lives of Wm. Vandeventer and Cyrus W. Field by unknown parties who shot at their address, through the mails, a complete "internal machine" is intended to blow them up. One of the machines exploded in the road pouch before arriving at its destination.

ON TO DENVER.

The Chicago, Burlington & Quincy are putting forth increased efforts to complete the extension of the B & M to Denver on or before June 1st, thirty days earlier than was originally intended, and with that end in view says the Omaha *Republican*, they will put on a force of men at the Denver end and begin track laying eastward at work at the rate of one mile a day, while a force at this end will continue to lay track westward at the rate of two miles a day, thus making in other three miles a day. At this rate the gap which is at this time sixty miles will be closed in less than thirty days. The track westward from Denver is to be laid with steel rails and will be the first steel ever laid in Colorado.

Freight trains for through business will positively begin running on the line of June and regular passenger trains will commence June 15th. The distance from the Missouri river to Denver is 700 miles, and it will be run in twenty-four hours, and possibly in twenty-two as the road is to be first class in every respect. The telegraph line is being built right along with the road. — *Star Journal*.

Mrs. Jesse James.

The wife of Jesse James was also his cousin, the daughter of a respectable people living near Kansas City. They were engaged in 1870, just after Jesse had been delivered an outlaw and a price set upon his head. Their courtship lasted five years. One evening they were together in the yard of his mother's residence at Kearney, when five men entered the house and made a ruthless search, the benefit lying under a bush twenty feet away. The girl's bill robbery netted \$2,000, of which Jesse received one-fifth, and on that capital they were married and went to Sherman, Texas, for their honeymoon. Jesse was a participant in the robberies at Corinth, Mississippi, and Muncie, Kansas. He subsequently raised fast horses at Ellipton, Tex., and was a delegate to the Democratic convention which nominated Gov. Porter. The daughter was born in Baltimore, during Jesse's absence on the Northfield raid. The son-in-law spent a week at the Centennial exposition, and recognized many people from Missouri. Last summer they lived in Kansas City under the name of Jackson, in a house in which the Blue cut robbery was planned, and which for a week afterwards sheltered the main actors in the hold crime. Mrs. James says her husband had nothing to do with the plundering of the treasurer's office at the Kansas City exposition, or the robberies at Baxter Springs, Kansas, and Ottumwa, Mo.

Washington Correspondence.

Error Cries—The Nation's sorrow has again been brought before our minds by the reports, major and minority, of the committee to audit the expenses of the late President Garfield's illness. The majority report, presented by Mr. Taylor, of Ohio, who represents Mr. Garfield's old district in Congress, recommends what it would seem is just and proper in the estimation of every fair-minded citizen. Mr. Taylor says, "that after giving such attention to the subject as its importance demands, your committee are of the opinion that Congress may properly and legally assume the expenses attendant upon the illness and burial of the late President, upon the grounds that he was stricken down while he was, and because he was in the discharge of his duties as chief executive officer of the nation, and Commander

in Chief of the army and navy. Congress would also be justified in making provision for such persons, regarding it as an office-act in the sense of a contract entered into by the nation, and not as a private arrangement. We do not enter into an argument, however, in general that it may be done, upon the people's part and their will be done. The committee, then, are to give the money to those who are to be paid for various persons who rendered services to the late president, in professional and other ways. The total amount for professional services is \$45,000, which is distributed as follows: Dr. D. W. Bliss, \$22,500; Dr. J. A. Agnew, and Hamilton, \$12,500 each; Dr. B. Phillips, \$10,000; and Dr. M.
