Charley Faus and Frank Miller, the boys who captured Simmerman and shot Belmont, received \$200 of the reward offered for the capture and conviction of the murderers. From Denver they proceed east to Lakin, Kansas, where Faus left his horses, and from there Miller goes to his ranch at Point of Rocks, where the murderers were captured, and Faus returning to his ranch, which lies twelve miles north west of Wa Keeny, Kansas.
